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# FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Zaca Lake, May 8--It was a clear, sunny morning with 53 participants divided into 4 groups. A cold wind blew puffy white clouds across the bright blue sky and the lupines covered the slopes to the north...an excellent setting for a day of birding. A total of 78 species were sighted. The warblers were missing, but the unusual sightings of active nests was worthwhile--Nuttall's woodpecker, Common Bushtit, Northern Oriole, House Wren, Lark Sparrow (on the ground in the meadow). Plain Titmice and Western Bluebirds were seen feeding their young. Two firsts for this trip were the Turkey and Dusky Flycatcher.

Salton Sea, July 27-28-- Eight intrepid birders waded up and down a waisthigh river, braved 113-degree heat, and were treated to a spectacular star shower as we slept under the open sky. A total of 90 species were observed, including excellent views of 3 Black Skimmers at close range, some Stilt Sandpipers, Least Bitterns, Wood Ibis, Fulvous Tree Ducks, Gull-billed and Black Terns, and Great-tailed Grackles. Also seen were numerous Burrowing Owls, Lesser Nighthawks, Abert's Towhees, Verdin, and one Crissal Thrasher.

A brief stop at Morongo Valley yielded Vermillion Flycatchers and a Summer Tanager.

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Golden Trout Camp--From August 4 to 10, 14 campers from Santa Barbara joined members of several other So. California Audubon Societies for a week of rustic luxury at Golden Trout Camp. Located west of Lone Pine at 10,000 feet in the Sierras, the camp is a private lease operated by Thatcher School within the National Forest.

Dr. William Wirtz organized a comprehensive natural history program. Thanks to his bird-banding equipment, we saw our birds in the hand as well as in the bush. A Dipper was in the creek and a very vociferous family of Kestrels was in a tree by our tents. Careful use of live traps facilitated the study of the local mammals, including shrew, pika, marmot, golden-mantled ground squirrel, lodgepole chipmunk, northern flying squirrel, pocket gopher, deer mouse, vole, porcupine, and weasel.

We hiked to the Cottonwood Lakes, breeding area of the golden trout; and an adventurous party climbed Mt. Langley (14, 042 feet). It was a magnificent week for everyone. We hope that Audubon will be able to make this program available in the future for more members of the Society.

# BIRD BRAIN--A COMPLIMENT?

Blue jays are not such bird brains after all, says a Westfield (Mass.) State College behavioral scientiest who claims the birds are faster learners than dogs or cats. Dr. Maxwell W. Hunter, assistant professor of psychology, has been studying blue jays and their learning habits for 7 years and found they learned quickly and "were able to solve any new, similar problems instantly."
