In the mail which accumulated while we were camping for two weeks in Eastern Arizona, I discovered a book which I think will interest many of our members. Agriculture in the City is a new book published by the Community Restructure 1 Council, spongers of the Santa Barbara Ecology Center and Recycling Center. The book deco ments what was learned at CEC's urban, educational farm project. It tells how the program at El Mirasol Farm taught intensive organic gardening methods and explains the solar energy and methane experiments developed there.

The nice thing about the book is that the gardening methods and alternative energy information it contains can easily be applied in your own back yard. The gardening section includes detailed information on raised-bed preparation, composting methods, pest control, etc.

Golden Trout Camp

I spent my first session at Golden Trout Camp during the last week in July - a great experience! The weather was beautiful - sum alternating with thunderstorms, fantastic cloud formations, alpenglow sunsets below Mt. Langley, even some snow on the highest peaks. The tents were dry, the dining hall warm from the wood-burning

stove, the showers hot, and the food delicious and plentiful. The meadows had great varieties of wildflowers and the creeks were full from the recent rains. We had a small group, 20, and it was really a pleasure getting to know everyone.

Our hikes, led by Ann Terry and Frank Farrand, varied from a few hours to all day and we usually encountered interesting birds and unusual plants. We saw Gray-crowsed Rosy Finches, Dippers, one Spotted Sandpiper, Williamson's Sapsucker (immature), Rufous Hummingbirds, Hammond's Flycatchers, Mountain Bluebirds, Clark's Nutcrackers, Red-tailed Hawk, and one Goshawk chasing a Black-tailed Jackrabbit (unsuccessfully). Also lots of Golden-mantled Ground Squirrels, Chipmunks, Marmots, Mule Deer, and of course, Golden Trout.

The naturalist programs in the evenings were very informative - we painlessly learned about the natural history of the Sierras, the history of the Owens Valley, birding spots in the Owens Valley and White Mountains, and meteorological causes of the thunder and lightening right over our heads.

A marvelous week!

Point Mugu Field Trip

On March 20th, 23 Auduboners enjoyed exceptional birding under the excellent guidance of Mr. Colley, stationed at Pt. Mugu Naval base. It was a cool, sunny day with strong east winds. Under such conditions we did not expect the best birding. However, by moving to the right spots, we sighted 82 species. Four White Pelicans, but not one Brown Pelican; White-faced Ibis; 14 species of ducks; Forster's, Common, Royal, and Caspian Terns. Even with the many ground squirrel holes, not one Burrowing Owl was seen.

Our former Mugu leader, Commander Baker, was conducting an experiment with Silver Salmon. He hopes to imprint the young to the Mugu Lagoon and thus introduce this salmon to the ocean south of the Oregon border.

This is a must trip for those who have not had the opportunity. My apologies for this late report and belated thanks to Mr. Colley for his enthusiasm in leading this trip.

Nongame Wildlife Program

Funds donated to California's Nongame Wildlife Conservation Program (DECAL) will be put to their first use next spring, according to the Department of Fish and Game. Included in the budget for 1976-77 are projects for three wildlife watering facilities in the desert, and a special guard at Morro Rock during the Peregrine Falcon nesting season. Tentative plans for projects in the following year include enhancement of the nesting environment for the endangered Southern Bald Eagle and a continuation of the special guard at Morro Rock.

Last spring SBAS decided to help promote the nongame program by a donation of \$350, and by collecting funds at the monthly meetings. Anyone wishing to make a contribution may give it to Jan Hamber at the next meeting.

Donations may also be sent directly to the Department of Fish and Game. Make checks payable to "Nongame Wildlife" and send to Wildlife, Box DFG, Sacramento, CA 95801. Contributions in any amount are accepted, but donors of \$5 or more will receive a special certificate of appreciation in addition to a wildlife decal.

Birding in the Chirichua Mountains

Inspired by Dale Zimmerman's article on the Chiricahuas in The Bird Watcher's America, which said: "There we have a greater share of rare and localized land birds than any other section of North America," we went to Cave Creek Ranch in Portal, Arizona. We had a most comfortable accommodation completely equipped for light housekeeping. Numerous bird feeders were located on the grounds, with a Bluethroated Hummingbird in residence at our back porch.

We made daily trips into the Coronado National Forest, visiting a different area each day. In our eight day stay, we obserwed 75 species, including a Berylline Hummingbird, a rare visitor from Mexico. A pair were nesting on the grounds for the first time. Other species sighted were White-eared Hummingbird, Coppery-tailed Trogon, Harlequin Quail, Brown-throated Wren, Eastern Meadowlark, Blue Grosbeak, Painted Redstarts, Cardinals, Roadrunners, Mexican Juncos, and Mexican Jays. Animal life was abundant? We saw deer, skunk, coatimundis, Apache Foxtailed Squirrel, and families of Javelinas. The park ranger reported that this was a bad year for migrants, probably due to the unusual weather conditions. For us, it was an exciting and enjoyable adventure.

Status of the National Audubon Society - As of May 1, 1976 the Society's totals stood at 375 chapters, with 353,845 members!
