PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

By the time you read this the 1978 Christmas Count will be history. One suspects that we will not have the number of wintering insectivores (warblers, flycatchers) of recent years due to the number of nights at or below freezing this month (December). It will be interesting to see if the count bears this out. The annual Christmas Count is an opportunity to enjoy the fellowship of birding, the beauty of the field, and the glorious objects of the quest within a larger framework of national censusing and analysis. Beauty, sport, companionship, and science meet each year at this time - I hope you have been able to take part, and that your experience has been memorable.

A statewide Audubon mini-convention is being held in Sacramento January 26-28. We will, of course, have representatives in attendance. A report of the proceedings will be printed in February's El Tecolote.

The December's Board of Directors' meeting produced the following items concerning which you will be interested:

- -A new stationery for SBAS is in print, utilizing a picture of Spotted Owls taken by our friend the late Dick Smith.
- -SBAS will have an exhibit at the 1969 Oil Spill commeration, January 28-29, sponsored by GOO and the Community Environmental Council.
- -SBAS donated \$100 to San Diego Audubon's Silverwood Sanctuary Fund.
- -We will once again provide a scholarship to the Audubon Camp of the West. A committee is at work selecting this year's recipient.
- -The annual SBAS picnic will be held in Stow Grove on June 2. Details will be forth-coming as the date approaches.

Mary Lou Hand is resigning as editor of El Tecolote after $3\frac{1}{2}$ years of diligent work at this critical task. A replacement is sorely needed. Those interested in the editorship should contact me at 964-9534 for further information.

In the coming year we can look forward to the development of the Nature Conservancy's stewardship of Santa Cruz Island - possibly including a Bald Eagle restoration program. Also on the horizon in 1979 will be further discussion concerning the desperate status of the California Condor.

For 1979 one wishes, of course, for peace. One also hopes for an expanding public awareness of that which is at stake in the seemingly interminable environmental issues assaulting us in the media. Our children and their grandchildren will be the beneficieries or victims of our actions. Let us resolve again to move responsibly, with such wisdom as we can muster, to preserve that which is irreplaceable.

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Owls of the West Symposium

The third annual symposium to be presented by the National Audubon Society's Western Education Center will be entitled ''Owls of the West; their Ecology and Conservation.'' This year's day-long program will be held in the Morrison Auditorium of the California Academy of Science in San Francisco on Saturday, January 20, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Included in the program will be presentations on the Spotted Owl's distribution along the Pacific Coast, owls of the riparian forest communities of the southwest, Barred Owls in the Columbia River Basin, and the status of the Great Gray Owl in California's Sierra Nevada. Much discussion will center on the special problems, particularly habitat loss, that concern the future of these unique animals.

Audubon Institute of Desert Ecology

The ninth annual Audubon Institute of Desert Ecology will be held May 3-6, 1979 at the Boyce Thompson Southwestern Arboretum west of Superior, Arizona. The Institute involves 60 participants in field studies of the Sonoran Desert. Under the leadership of 6 professional staff members, participants expl re and study the interrelationships of earth and life forms. The Arboretum is located at the base of Picket Post Mountain, and situated along intermittent Queen Creek, which allows for ideal desert and riparian study. All meals during the Institute are catered, and participants have a choice of dormitory-style sleeping accommodations or camping facilities. Registration is \$150 for campers, \$160 for dormitory residents. University credit (graduate or undergraduate) is available for an additional fee. The Institute is available to all adults over 18. Field Trip Reports

Big Sycamore Canyon, September 30

A pleasant morning greeted about 10 birders at Sycamore Canyon. Most of us saw a Brewer's Sparrow, an adult Merlin, as well as an incredible display of Cooper's and Sharp-shinned Hawks and Kestrels all diving at one another at the tops of the rolling hills above our heads. As we were leaving several of us stayed out at Mugu Rock to witness a feeding display of Brown Pelicans, all the local cormorants (Brandt's, Double-crested, and Pelagic), and both Jaegers (Parasitic and Pomeraine), as well as numerous other species.

McGrath State Park, October 14

The park was closed due to road surfacing, so 14 birders birded in the Santa Clara River bottom, along the west bank, and later the sanitation ponds. At least 54 species were sighted Many Long-billed Marsh Wrens scolded us at close range from the cattails around the ponds. Among a flock of American Wigeon were 2 with very yellow crowns instead of white. The heads, however, lacked the ruffous of the European Wigeon. Could they be half breeds? A Common Gallinule and a Soara Rail ended the day's search as the fog began to move in. 'Twas indeed a satisfying bird walk.

Bird Refuge and Harbor, October 15

Early morning fog kept the attendance to 10 birders on this trip. Forty species were sighted, but the lack of wild ducks is discouraging. It's great to have the Snowy and Great Egrets returning and find so many Black-crowned Night Herons around the Refuge.

Point Mugu, November 19

On a crisp, sunny day 19 members of SBAS met Mr. Ron Dow, Ecology assistant at the Pacific Missle Test Center at Pt. Mugu for a day of birding. We saw no unusual species, but had excellent viewing of the many individuals in each of the 76 species tallied. 6 Cattle Egrets and 5 varieties of hawks were the highlights for many.

Color-banded Snowy Plovers

During the breeding season at Mono Lake and Monterey Bay several hundred Snowy Plovers were color-banded. Birds were marked with aluminum bands wrapped with colored tape. Each bird has 1 or 2 color bands on either the upper or lower leg and each band has 2 colors. The number and position of the band(s) on the leg and the position of the colors on each band identify the banding location, the bird's age, and its specific identity.
