


- General Meeting Tonight Dr. Rod Nash, professor of History and Environmental Studies, will be speaking this evening on "The American Wilderness, Past, Present and Future." Dr. Nash is a widely renowned environmental historian who played a leading role in the response to the 1969 Santa Barbara Oil Spill and was the author of the internationally published Santa Barbara Declaration of Environmental Rights. Meetings are held in the Fleischmann Auditorium at the Museum of Natural History and begin promptly at 8:00 pm.

Birds in Santa Barbara by Paul Lehman

In a way, this has been a fall of contrasts. While the number and variety of vagrants occuring in the Santa Barbara area to date have been at or slightly above average, the number of more regular, western migrants has been quite low. At present, the cause(s) of these low numbers is unknown.

During September and early October. the most exciting sightings included Wormeating, Bay-breasted, Magnolia, Chestnutsided, Mourning and Canada Warblers, two Lark Bunting and two Dickcissels in Goleta; another Mourning, Blackburnian, and Virginia Warbler in Carpinteria; a Broadwinged Hawk at Refugio State Beach; and single Northern Parulas and Black-throated Blue and Prarie Warblers near Santa Maria. All of these eastern species are very rare er casual visitors to our area, primarily in the fall. A Bell's Vireo in Goleta in early September represents the first record ever of a fall migrant seen in this county. One or two "Yellow-green" Vireos in Goleta during mid-October were probably from western Mexico and had migrated approximately 180° in the wrong direction; this reversed migration also occurs regularly in Tropical Kingbirds, also from west Mexico, which occur here annually in fall in very small numbers. This is only the second or third record of this vireo (now considered a sub-species of the Redeyed Vireo) for Santa Barbara County. A Great-tailed Grackle was in Goleta and later at Refugio State Beach in September; while there are only several records for the county, this species may well begin to occur with more regularity as it is increasing in abundance and spreading north throughout much on the interior Southwest.

Several unusual water birds also appeared during the early fall period. The highlights included three Stilt Sandpipers near Santa Maria and a Buff-breaster Sandpiper near Point Magu.

Finally, during the second week of October the Grace's Warbler was found to have returned for its fourth (at least) winter to Montecito. Quite a feat for this celebrity!


FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Atascadero Creek
Beginner's Bird Walk

Our first fall birdwalk for beginners drew a dozen participants to Atascadero Creek on a beautiful Thursday morning. While we did not find the Waterthrush or the Bobolink that were reported in the area, we did get good views of a score or more species. Amoung the more interesting were a pair of White-tailed Kites hunting, a Western Kingbird also foraging, and views of Loggerhead Shrike and Blue-gray Gnatcatcher.

Catalina Island

Thirty Auduboners and friends were guests of the Catalina Island Marine Institute Sept. 10-12 for the third annual Audubon field trip to the island. At Toyon Bay five miles northeast of Avalon, institute specialists conducted field trips through the volcanic hills where the buffalo roam, and offshore in wet suits and snorkel gear to coves where many fish species flourish.

Laboratory demonstrations included a close look at a great variety of marine life, including microscopic projections of plankton scooped up during small boat excursions.


Indian lore, free time, campfires, a film of underwater habitat, and birding made the weekend pass quicklt. Minna Smith led the group this year.

Deveraux Slough

Ten courageous birders braved a rainy morning to tour the Deveraux Slough and were rewarded with an end to the drizzle as the walk began. To our delight, in several minutes we were bathed in sunlight and blessed with many good views of an enormous variety of birds. As was expected, shorebirds abounded including American Avocet, Long-billed Curlew, both Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, Dunlin, four Pectoral Sandpipers and a Red Knot. Herons and egrets, including a close look at a Green Heron, were easily had in the slough. Other interesting birds included Western Wood Peewee, Belted Kingfisher, Redshouldered Hawk and White-tailed Kite.

Conservation Committee message:

This year we are re-vamping the Committee. We will hold monthly meetings (or biweekly if nessesary or desireable). The following will be required of volunteers:

- 5. Chance to strengthen our position by forming coalitions with other groups interested in your area of expertise or concern.
- 6. Great chance to meet others in SBAS, as well as work with coalitions of our own committees and the Board of Directors.

CONSERVATION NEWS

Prop. 13 The lucky number for water

During the recent Peripheral Canal campaign, all sides agreed California needs a comprehensive water policy. Prop. 13 on the November ballot is the conservationists proposal for such a policy.

Key elements include:

Conservation: requiring economically competitive water conservation programs be developed at local levels before importation can begin. Price subsides for large water users are discouraged.

In-stream: giving the Water Resources Control Board authority to sustain water levels in rivers, lakes, estuaries and wetlands for recreation, wildlife and water quality.

Groundwater: mandating locally developed and implemented management programs in basins currently identified as critically overdrafter.

The Water Conservation initiative has received considerable support from many conservation organizations including California League of Conservation Voters, National Audubon Society, Planning and Conservation League, Sierra Club, Friends of the Earth, and Friends of the River.

Wetlands Protection

Destruction of America's wetlands has been greatly slowed under section 404 of the Clean Water Act administered by the Army Corps of Engineers.

Now, William Gianelli, Assistant Secretary to the Army has issued regulations reducing the role of the corps and other agencies in wetlands protection. Projects permissible in wetland areas now include strip-mining, small hydro-electric facilities and others with no opportunity of site-by-site review of these projects. Even worse, unregulated development of prarie potholes, lakes and bogs is now permited nationwide.

Groups to play a more restricted regulatory role include the Environmental Protection Agency and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

The last crushing blow is Gianellis' plan to limit the corps' jurisdiction to "navigable waters" which would exclude 85% of the wetlands currently covered by 404 including fresh & salt water marshes, bogs, wet meadows, prarie potholes, and bottomland hardwood swamps.
