BIRDS IN SANTA BARBARA

August shorebirding was largely concentrated at Laguna Blanca, where small numbers of Solitary, Semipalmated, Baird's and Pectoral Sandpipers were seen due to the low water levels.

The fall landbird season got off to a quick start this year with early, exciting sightings in late August of Red-eyed Vireo and Kentucky Warbler in Carpinteria and Worm-eating Warbler in Goleta. During the first half of September some of the local highlights included 2 Prothonotary Warblers in Carpinteria, Eastern Kingbird in Santa Barbara, and Bell's Vireo, Dickcissel, and Lark Bunting in Goleta. A Chestnutbacked Chickadee in Goleta establishes the second record for the South Coast of a species not particularly known to wander. Probably the most watched bird of the period was the adult Scissor-tailed Flycatcher present near Lompoc, the third record for Santa Barbara County.

\$2,000 ANNUAL RESEARCH AWARDS

The Los Angeles Audubon Society will be giving annual Research Awards beginning in February 1986. Award recipients will be limited to students, amateurs and others with limited or no access to major granting agencies. The Awards shall be given for research relevant to the biology of birds. Applicants must reside in southern California (from San Luis Obispo, Kern and San Bernardino Counties south) or be currently enrolled in a southern California academic institution; there is no geographical restriction on the research area. One or more awards will be given. The total amount to be awarded will be approximately \$2,000.

The board passed a resolution (vote 9-1) to send a letter to the Los Padres Forest Supervisor at the National Forest Service supporting a designated area for mountain bicycles and banning them from trails in the National Forest. We had an update on the Santa Barbara Bird Refuge. The city is seeking funds from the Nature Conservancy. The city would like our support for the plan which the Conservancy adopts. The plans for the October wheelchair-bound bird trip are going great, but we need more volunteers; if anyone is interested, please call the Audubon office.

INTEREST IN BIRD-WATCHING SOARS

According to a recent United States Fish and Wildlife Service survey, people in all walks of life are enjoying our feathered friends. The survey finds that about one quarter of the American population watches birds and that 3 percent of this group consider themselves to be "committed" birders. A committed birder, by definition, can easily identify 40 different species of birds. Birders are also well informed about key wildlife and environmental issues.

El Tecolote means the owl. At least in Honduras and Mexico it does. Other words for owl in Mexico are lechuza, buho, mochuelo, but tecolote is the most popular.

Dear Rob.

"Tecolote" is Spanish American for "Owl." The word is <u>not</u> used in Spain, but <u>is</u> commonly used in Mexico and other Spanish-language countries in the Americas. My source is the University of Chicago Spanish Dictionary, but I'm sure any good-sized Spanish dictionary will tell you the same.

As you know, SB Audubon was founded in June 1963. Members were invited to suggest names for our bulletin...My suggestion was "El Tecolote," which received the most votes. I drew the first masthead (on a mimeo master, yet) and we used it from November of 1963 - with occasional variations as the mood struck me - until May of 1966, when we unveiled our new masthead designed by Dick Smith, using his photograph of a young screech owl...
