A WEEK AT POINT REYES

I recently spent a most delightful week of hiking, birding, and learning all about the Point Reyes Peninsula, sponsored by Elderhostel, an organization for those over 60 who are active and have an insatiable curiosity about our world.

The week took place at Point Reyes National Education Center, Point Reyes, Ca. 94956, (416)663-1200 (another program is to be run soon). We had the privilege of studying with Al Molina, Anne Rovetta, Bob Stewart, Doug Emory, and Mike Ellis. All are experienced Naturalists, some specializing in biology, geology, and, of course, ornithology. In 5 days we saw 90 species. Bob Stewart put up mist nets and we were able to see closeups of Yellow Warblers, Willow Flycatchers, and Western Flycatchers.

The natural beauty of the area is unsurpassed- the solitary beaches. color of the chapparal, wooded trails, superb trees and flowers, lighthouse,Farralon Islands, and of course the birds!

We were 22 brave souls with crude sleeping accomodations, no elctricity, and toilet facilities 150 yards from the bunk! The social hall and dining room were modern and the meals gourmet.

SUPPORT FOR LOS PADRES NEEDED

Jim Mills, from the Los Padres Forest Coalition (a coalition of conservation groups), brought information to the board meeting regarding the Los Padres National Forest Plan currently proposed by the Forest Service. This plan would guide forest management for the next 10-15 years, and covers Wilderness & Roadless Areas, Wild & Scenic Rivers, Oil & Gas Leasing, Shooting, Grazing & Prescribed Burns.

(The Coalition commends the Forest Service Plan overall, they propose certain changes that make a difference of some 235,000 acres designated as part of the forest, 62 miles of scenic river, more control of where shooting be allowed, etc.)

Letters are urgently needed to be sent to Forest Service, Art Carrol, Los Padres National Forest, 6244 Calle Real, Goelta, ca. 93117-203. The deadline for public input is October 30, 1986.

The coalition asks that you commend the Forest Service Plan and be positive, but urge them to adopt the Conservation Alternative's proposal.

More detailed information is available in a pamphlet from the Coalition; a copy is available in our office, or call Anne Van Tyne locally at 965-8709.

EDITOR'S CORNER

Following is a letter I received and was asked to print in "El Tecolote" with the idea that it would be of interest to our readers.

It occurs to me that a "Letters to the Editor" column might be a valid forum for members to communicate on issues or concerns that are out there. So, this letter is published as the first of such an effort and I invite readers to submit other such letters to be shared!

Dear Editor,

Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, are all very much in the headlines lately. Many of us tend to shrug and think, "Well, that's nothing to do with me." Well, avid birder or annchair naturalist you may be, think again. One of the places "our" birds migrate to or thru is Central America. And it's time you got involved.

I'm writing to share more information from the Environmental Project on Central America (EPOCA) with the Tecolote readers. (EPOCA was featured in last month's Tecolote - Editor's Note) The new S.B. chapter is headed by Tom Dudley (968-0128).

In the U.S., citizens, policy makers and the press debate the <u>social</u> causes and consequences of conflict in Central America, seldom addressing the profound <u>environmental</u> crisis now affecting the region. On the other hand, the U.S. environmental movement has neglected social issues when discussing the ecological crisis plaguing the isthmus. However, the region's social & ecological crises are intimately related products of unjust political & economic systems whose historical roots run deep.

The U.S. environmental movement <u>must</u> play an important role in reform in Central America by injecting its perspective into public debate: The raising of beef, cotton, & other export crops, the application of pesticides which are banned or restricted in the U.S., military construction and manuevers, all have tremendous social and environmental impacts. The new environmental policies in Nicaragua are being destroyed by the area'a civil war. Our government's military build-up in Central America is one of the region's greatest environmental problems.

We must join hands with others working for peace and justice in Central America, for peace and justice are the two fundamental pre-requisites for an environmentally sustainable future.

Locally, call COMPA, 962-0254 for news and action; and support EPOCA, from whose "Green Paper #2" this letter was written. They publish a series of reports - order them, read them, spread the word.

I'll write more and address more directly the crisis: eg., if those banned pestcides are used down there, then the U.S. imports them, and we consumers buy and eat them, where are those pesticides ultimately ending up?

Ask yourself questions!!?!
