

"BUSHES FOR BIRDERS: A BIRDWATCHERS GUIDE TO SANTA BAR-BARA PLANT COMMUNITIES" will be presented by Dr. Steve Timbrook, Director of the Ganna Walska Lotusland Foundation.

Program begins at 8:00 p.m. in Farrand Hall at the Natural Histroy Museum.


The workshop topic this month will be ducks - how to zero in on field marks. Preprogram workshop begins at 7:00 p.m. in the Bird Hall.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

There had been a recent surge in the number of conservation issues needing to be addressed by our membership. It is important that we all give our input regarding these issues to the appropriate agencies — it is not a pleasant lot, but issues we must face.

The first of the issues at hand is one that crept quietly into existence without notice, and has resulted in the destruction of significant local riparian habitat. The County Flood Control Agency has recently destroyed habitat at Atascadero, San Jose, and Carpinteria Creeks amoung others. For those of you who may not be familiar it is these three creeks that produce much of the best bird habitat in the county, and it is this habitat that is responsible for making Santa Barbara famous worldwide in birding circles. At this time the creeks have been so altered that they will not be productive for years to come. It is not that we are not sympathetic to the needs of flood control, but the damage done was far too extensive to be necessary - in addition to annual plants that were cut back, long-standing trees were removed. And this came after several birders in the county had made an informal agreement with Jack Fertig of County Flood Control as to the amount of clearing needed. This trust was completely violated by the actions of the agency. It is important that this "quiet issue" get the attention it deserves. Write to Flood Control, the County Board of Supervisors, the News-Press and help change the manner in which clearing is done.

Secondly, it is important to make the <u>City Council of the City of Santa Barbara</u> aware of our concern for the <u>Least Bell's Vireo and its critical habitat around Gibraltar reservoir</u>. The proposed raising of the dam to increase the city's water supply would destroy this critical habitat for the second largest breeding population of this endangered species. The area has been designated critical habitat, but our input is still needed to convince authorities of the right course of action. This species is getting alot of bad press which it does not deserve!

The third issue I wish to bring to your attention is the wetland area adjacent to Los Carneros Road at Hollister AVenue in Goleta. This area is currently the only local winter roosting site for the Black-Shouldered Kite. It also is a significant piece of wetland habitat with extensive willow growth and several rare wetland plants. A development project at this site was temporarily restrained from grading while permits are sought from the Army Corps of Engineers (somehow this is out of the hands of County officials). There is still time to persuade the A.C.E. to deny permission for development. Write Fred Butler (addresses below) and the County Board of Supervisors.

On a positive note, there is currently land for sale on the More Mesa property in Santa Barbara. It will be important to persuade the county to purchase this property to make an open space preserve.

Also on a positive note, be aware that a Land Preservation Bill is to be introduced to the legislature in 1988. It is designed to provide funds for very extensive land acquisition. For more information contact Michael Feeney at 962-4375. Work is to begin on a thorough petition signature drive to get it on the ballot.

Art Carroll from the Forest Service highlighted the meeting with a summary of the why, how, and what now of the Forest Service 10-year plan for Los Padres.


Some future events that you might be interested in noting are:

A committee was formed to review the by-laws of SBAS and resolve some descrepancies that currently exist.

Chris reported that fundraising efforts are underway to promote passage of a State Land Acquisition Bond that will be used to buy valuable open spaces in each county. A signature drive begins in May or June and if the bond is passed one million dollars will be spent locally for every 5,000 signatures on the petition!
