






Birds of Santa Barbara



Avian highlights in Santa Barbara county from early September to early October included single Spragues and Red-throated Pippits in Goleta, (the former great-plains species occurring locally for the second time ever and the latter a very rare visitor from Siberia. A beautiful Painted Red-start was in Hope Ranch for one day only in late September, while a Canada Warbler was in Carpinteria and a Hooded Warbler was briefly seen in Goleta.

Other rarities from the East were a Chestnut-collared Longspur, two Dickcissel, and a Chestnut-sided Warbler.

Returning for its <u>ninth</u> year was the patriarch of Santa Barbara rarities, the Montecito Grace's Warbler.

Several montane species occurred in the coastal lowlands in unprecedented numbers: four separate White-headed Woodpeckers, a flock of Pinyon Jays, and good numbers of Pygmy Nuthatches.

Farther afield, Ventura County recorded a Yellow-green Vireo (from Mexico), a Connecticut warbler, and a Sharp-tailed Sandpiper (from Siberia).

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A special meeting of the board was held on September 24 to discuss finances. Due to the reduction in dues-sharing by National and the ever-increasing costs of doing business, we must find ways to make ends meet. Our annual budget averages \$12,000 - \$5,500 of which has been used just to produce and deliver this newsletter to our 1,100 members and subscribers.

Our income has averaged \$8,000, most of which comes from NAS membership renewals (approximately \$6,000 per year). The rest has come from interest on what <u>was</u> a substantial savings account (the result of two generous estate donations several years ago).

However, to make up for our expenses vs. income, the last several years we have drawn an average of \$4,000 to \$5,000 from savings each year. Our current savings balance is \$13,500, which will be used up in three years' time if other means of revenue are not found.

We can increase our membership; we get \$15 from NAS for each of these; we do intend to have more membership drives. It would take 350 new members each year just to maintain status quo; that may not sound like a lot, but to gain that many each year would be a significant feat.

We will cut back on El Tecolote until more revenue is found. As of January 1988 we will publish only six times per year (every other month). We will stick to four pages only (except for Bird Count registrations). This will save us \$1,600 annually.

A special committee is being formed to pursue revenue sources-donations, estate-planning, and fundraising. If you have suggestions or wish to participate, please call me. Your generosity would be most appreciated if you could contribute to the continued efforts of our Local Chapter.

Next month, more details will be given on what you get for your money.


Christmas Count
