"Poor Mans or Hobo Cruises" by local resident Steven Gibbs. Paddling an 18 foot sea kayak he explored the rugged wilderness of Prince William Sound in 1987. Glaciers up to a mile wide are seen along with mountains that tower over 7000 feet above the floating boat. Icebergs move slowly by carrying harbor seals. Orcas, Porpoise and sea otters are often spotted. Numerous Bald Eagles are attracted to a variety of salmon runs. Over 200 species of birds have been sighted in the sound. Special sound effects were recorded on location for this spectacular audio-visual presentation. Note earlier start time.

"Computers Assist California Condor"
Prof. Frank Davis of the UCSB Dept. of
Geography is setting up a computer data
base using a geographic information system and satellite maps. As part of the
Condor Recovery Program they are mapping
information on the historical patterns
of condor activity and habitat. This
will be valuable when the condors are
released from the zoos.

We will also have some of Jan Hamber's excellent slides of the latest newborn condors. An associate with the S.B.M.N.H. and a condor biologist, Ms. Hamber has worked on field research with the condors for 14 years.

Our fall and early winter field trips had outstanding variety. The Monterey weekend was excellent for pelagic species with many of the fifteen participants tallying over 20 new life birds! These included Thick-billed Murre, Tufted Puffin, Fleshfooted Shearwater, Black-footed Albatross, South Polar Skua and jaegers among others. 52 people turned out for the well publicized Carpinteria Slough nature walk. I'm told this was the best turn out ever for a trip with the exception of a Condor trip around 1980. Compliments to Wayne Ferren for doing an outstanding job bringing the marsh to life for all the participants. Pt. Mugu highlights included a Short-eared Owl hunting in broad daylight, thirty-two Black Skimmers, numerous waterfowl and over a thousand Western Sandpipers wheeling and turning in perfect unison for a minute directly in front of our group. They were so close we heard the whistling of the wind on their wings. It was breathtaking. The Devereux Slough trip permitted excellent views of Merlin, Brandt and many shorebirds including an amazing 150 Snowy Plovers. Nichols Arabians Ranch had Ferruginous Hawk, near-flying Bald and Golden Eagles, Black-throated Swifts and 3 Tundra Swans. Participants also had the opportunity to grab bunches of low hanging Mistletoe for the holidays.
