


There will be time for socializing, and games including volleyball, basketball, and swimming in the heated pool. (Dinner approximately 2:00 pm).

MARCH AND APRIL FIELD TRIPS

The last Devereux trip had wide varieties of water and land birds. Blue-winged Teal, Rufous Hummingbird, Hooded Oriole Black-shouldered Kite and five species of swallows were highlites.

The Sierra trip was favored with beautiful weather and spectacular scenery along with a tour and slide show on Mono Lake. Pinyon Jays, Lewis Woodpecker, Dipper, Bank Swallow, Blue Grouse and 150+ Sage Grouse were highlights of the 75 species seen.

The theme was "Protecting Ecological Landscapes"--Beringia in Alaska, ancient forests, Wetlands, refuges, the Platte Valley, oil, driftnets, California desert. Many informative workshops, videos and slide programs were held.

April's theme was to save wetlands. For our part, we participated in the cleanup of three creeks--Carpinteria, Mission and Devereux.

The Save-the-Mountain lion initiative has qualified for the June 5th ballot as Proposition 117. Thanks to all who signed and circulated petitions.

The Western Regional Office of the National Audubon Society recently requested chapters to select five priority conservation issues from a list they provided.

The Santa Barbara Board selected the following for our chapter:

- Wildlife, impacts of commercial fishing gill-netting, purse seining.
- 2a. Wetland and riparian forest protection.
- b. Ancient forest protection.
- 3. Reauthorization of the Clean Air Act/acid rain.
- 4. International program for the conservation of migratory species, endangered species, and habitats
- 5. Offshore oil and gas development.
