GRASSLANDS CARRIZO PLAINS: LAST OF THE

> Wildlife Research Photographer B. "Moose" Peterson, guest lecturer, will present a slide show of this exotic area at the general meeting on Friday evening, November 30.

He describes California's central valley as "once a vast grassland with herds of Tule Elk and Pronghorn stalked by Grizzly Bears. Today the grasslands and

the animals they supported are nearly gone.

"This show looks at the last example of grassland habitat left intact. The Carrizo Plains is the home of many endangered plants and animals which we'll discover by starting below the

ground with the sky the limit." Mr. Peterson has spent years in wildlife photographic research in ornithology and mammology, including such rare and endangered species as the Southern spotted owl, black swift, and Least Bell's vireo, and his works have been widely accepted and published.

AUDUBON'S 101st ANNUAL BIRD COUNT COMING ON SATURDAY, DECEMBER 29, 1990

Auduboners and friends are all welcome to help the Chapter in one of the most important environmental events of each year - the 101st Annual Audubon Bird Count - to be held locally this year on Saturday, December 29th.

On this date, SBAS birders and friends spread out in groupsto cover the Santa Barbara count circle, a $7\frac{1}{2}$ mile radius centered at Foothill and San Marcos Roads, to identify and count all species and numbers of wild birds within our territorial circle. on land and sea. A LETTER FROM HELEN MATELSON PAWNEE NAT'L GRASSLANDS, COLORADO

Where were you the week of June 18, 1990? If the answer is other than Fort Collins, you missed the birding event..of the decade.

Located near Pawnee National Grasslands and the Colorado Rockies, the town hosted the 1990 convention of the American Birding Association...the best since my first in Bangor, Me., in 1980. Super birding is possible here where Eastern and Western birds co-mingle...and 700 super-birders as well from U.S., Canada, Mexico, and even Finland.


On a day's field trip, I netted the Mc-Gown's longspur of the prairie, and the White-tailed ptarmigan of the 12,000 foot tundra.
...Watching longspurs do their courtship display is a thrilling event.

Workshops were conducted by Ken Kaufman, Dared Pearson, Frank Gill, and lectures by Roger T. Peterson...Shawneen Finnegan coordinated originals of wildlife art...

Guy McMaskie led a super-field trip of 250 plus birders by bus to a 10,000'high spot, where, in total silence all walked 100 yards into the forest, to surround a nesting box. A tiny scratch on the pole brought the owl out for a look...this beautiful little Boreal owl in the quiet forest calmly surveyed the scene and then popped back to care for her young.. an emotional experience for many in the group.

The next convention is at Mobile, Alabama, in two years, during the Spring migration.

tainers, with paper and plastics being the major balances of wastes collected.

The trash analysis, which is an important part of this nationwide coastal reclamation campaign, revealed that hundreds of non-degradable cigarette filters were found.

Four dead seals cast a saddening note to the affair. Causes of death were not determined by the clean-up groups.

AUDUBON BOARD REPORTS...



September: Ron spoke in Solvang against a proposed golf course near Cachuma Reservoir, with pesticide run-off and habitat disturbances being Audubon concerns. He has also filed Audubon's written comments on the Goleta Draft Impact Report. The Board also endorsed actions to continue follow-up protests against UCSB expansion plans at the Regent's meeting and with the Coastal Commission.

Board joined Audubon support for Prop. 130, the Forest and Wildlife Bond Act, and to oppose Prop 138, the timber industry counter - initiative.

Lee Moldaver reported on current conservation issues of concern, including development of Carpinteria Bluffs, S.B. Rehab. Institute's plans on Calle Reale (near Patterson), a 5-year redevelopment plan for the Bird Refuge, fund shortages for recapping the leaking Carpinteria oil wells; and a positive note on State funds expanding Purissima preserves!

Board endorsed "Save Ellwood Shores" move to publicize threats of overdevelopment of the rare dunes areas still remaining.

October: Board received \$2343 grant from S.B. Foundation, for education equipment and an office copier to augment ed activities.Letter of deep appreciation sent. Everett King welcomed scope and binoculars purchased under United Way grant received in August, as helpful tools for special field trip groups.

Board noted next steps needed against UCSB expansion plans, and agreed to join Sierra and other groups to raise funds and fight issues at Coastal Commission stages.

Other species we need include: any Geese, Dippers, Pygmy owls, Long-billed Curlews.
