

"Southeast Arizona — Exotic Birding North of the Border"

Join Joan Lentz, local author, and Shawneen Finnegan. artist and photographer, as they take you on a guided tour of one of the most famous birding hot-spots in North America: the southeast region of Arizona. You'll enjoy slides of the birds and scenery you can expect to find on a trip to this exotic birding location. If you plan to visit this fabulous area, bring your questions.

Tonight's program will be based on a chapter from Joan Lentz's latest book, Great Birding Trips of the West. She teaches birding classes locally for Adult Education, the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden and the Museum of Natural History. Joan has also written Bird-Watching — A Guide for Beginners (with Judith Young).

Shawneen Finnegan has long had a strong interest in both the outdoors and photography. She attended the San Francisco Academy of Art, studying photography just after her interest in birding developed. Since that time she has traveled extensively across the U.S. and Canada, photographing birds and their habitats. Currently she is Editor's Assistant for Birding magazine. She also co-leads tours for WINGS, Inc., a national birding tour company. with her husband, Paul Lehman. Art and bird illustration occupies her time when she is at home in Santa Barbara.




Activities Calendar

- Mar. 14 Rocky Nook Park/Botanic Garden. A half-day field trip for beginners. Led by Everett King (962-0883), this will be a morning of birding and perhaps also some wildflowers. Meet at 7:30 a.m. at Rocky Nook.
- Mar. 21 Los Cerritos Wetlands Tour. Long Beach Sierra Club and El Dorado Audubon Society are inviting our members to join this annual tour of Alamitos Bay marshlands. The two-mile guided walk during the morning takes about two hours, with groups leaving every 15 minutes. - Mar. 28 Stow House/Lake Los Carneros. Rob Lindsay (964-9514) will lead this morning's field trip to view resident waterfowl and marsh birds. Meet Rob at Lake Los Carneros parking lot, Los Carneros Road, Goleta at 7:30 a.m.
- Apr. 11 Western Regional Conference at Asilomar. Plan to 14 to attend this traditional biennial conference. All Audubon issues are addressed, workshops go nonstop, and the fellowship is great.
- Apr. 18 Refugio Road. Half-day field trip starting early. We'll bird the lower reaches of the road and then head for the top for a short hike and lunch. Afterwards we'll drive down into the Santa Ynez Valley and stop at Cachuma Dam for additional sightings. Meet at Jack-in-the-Box, corner of Hollister and Storke at 7 a.m. Leader is Ron Hirst (967-0138). Bring food and water.
- Apr. 25 Surf/La Purisima Mission. This field trip, led by Everett King (962-0883), will focus on marsh birds and shore birds at Surf, and chaparral and riparian birds at the Mission. Meet at Carl's Jr., State St. and La Cumbre Rd, at 7:30 a.m. for car pooling. Bring lunch.
- May 2 Southern California Coordinating Council Meeting hosted by SBAS. 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the SBMNH Bird Habitat Hall. This regional meeting will have NAS and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service representatives presenting topical regional wildlife and legislative information. The preliminary plan is for an emphasis on endangered species. Full agenda in next issue.

Santa Barbara Botanic Garden

March 5, 7:30 p.m.: Botanic Garden Library
Lecture: "Treasures of the Flora: Rare and Endangered Plants and Habitats in the Golden State" by
Mary Carroll, Director of Education at the Santa
Barbara Botanic Garden. Mary will discuss factors
contributing to California's rich plant heritage as well
as underlying causes for species decline and extinction.
A special plant heritage of some of the rarest local
plant species and habitats will highlight the lecture.

March 12, 7:30 p.m.: Farrand Hall Lecture: "The Desert Tortoise and the Endangered Species Act: Prospects for Survival" by biologist Ray Bransfield of U.S. Fish and Wildlife. The Endangered Species Act is up for review in Congress this year. Ray will discuss prospective changes, and how they might affect listed species such as the desert tortoise.

Conservation Notes

- Earth Day 1992: April 26 will be Earth Day. Our chapter will again staff a booth. Last year's participation was a great success. Every bit of Audubon literature was distributed long before the exhibit closed, and the looks of wonderment as young children got to touch and examine life-size raptors and shore birds (courtesy, S.B. Natural History Museum) were thrilling. We need your help with this year's booth. If you have an idea for making it visually interesting, or if you have one or two hours that you can donate to help us staff it, your assistance would be greatly valued. Please contact the Audubon office at your early convenience. This year's committee is forming now.
- Asilomar: The annual Audubon workshop and nature retreat at Asilomar, on the Monterey Peninsula, is also coming up soon (April 11 to 14). If you've never experienced one of these, you're missing something special. Contact the SBAS office for more information; the prices are very reasonable.
- Drought-breaking rains: Outstanding opportunities for hiking and birding will be in abundance throughout the county as a result of our drought-breaking storm cycle this winter. Humans "adjust" to prolonged dry spells, but plants and animals experience traumatic stress to their ecosystems and their lives. Recharging our creeks, streams, waterfalls, estuaries and coastal wetlands will also recharge our area's natural food-chain. Expect profusions of wildflowers this spring, and the return of several bird species scarce in these parts since the dry spells began. If you haven't gone on one of Audubon's free, guided nature walks lately, this may be the perfect season to resume. Either way, do make a special effort to return to cherished birding areas of former years, and observe what a transformation the rains have wrought.
- Election year: With the profusion of new or unfamiliar political candidates coming forward this year for local, state and federal offices, it's especially important to carefully examine how their views compare with your own. Don't be shy about asking them, if you're not sure. We have three County Supervisors seats, one Congressional seat, two U.S. Senate seats, and the office of President in contention. The selections we make will influence policies on nature and the environment for many years to come. Be prepared to use your responsibility wisely.

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Board of Directors' Meeting

February: The Board was updated on National Audubon old-growth forest and wetlands initiatives, and the visits by board members to the Playa del Rey Education Office. Treasurer has put his monthly report into an easily readable format which shows the chapter running under budget this year and increasing reserves. Mike Pahos, Parks Director, County Parks Department, gave the Board a 45-minute presentation on the status and plans for an Open Space District in Santa Barbara County, which was much appreciated. Membership Chair reported *El Tecolote* mailing list currently totals 1,354 names.

A few weeks ago Nancy King, Everett King, Lee Moldaver and I attended a reception for Peter Berle, National Audubon President, at the regional Audubon Education Office in Playa del Rey. Peter, in L.A. to address business leaders during the day, spoke strongly about our wetlands campaign, ancient forests and the ANWR legislation victory. He spent some time talking to Everett about his work for our chapter and his goals. When talking with Lee about the innovative electric buses Santa Barbara MTD uses, he thought these could be an appropriate topic for an article in the *Audubon Activist* newsletter.

A week later, your leaders again went to the Education Office in Playa del Rey, the occasion this time being the quarterly Southern California Coordinating Council meeting. Joining me on this trip were Sally Walker and David Wass, our chapter wetlands coordinator. This meeting emphasized wetlands issues and legislation, and included wetlands presentations on the Salton Sea and South Coast wetlands, plus updates on California's old-growth forests, endangered species and the California Audubon Lobbyist. Sally presented our chapter activities report to the ninety people in attendence.

Your Board of Directors is seeking members to assume leadership responsibilities in the chapter. Real needs exist in Education and Conservation, and we can use help with *El Tecolote* Newsletter, Programs, Field Trips, Hospitality, Special Events, etc. Elections will be in June and Board positions will be available.
