Christmas Count Tallies Several Rarities; Misses Some Regulars

FTER a day of scanning wetlands, scrambling up hiking trails, walking suburban streets from Ellwood to Montecito, and ranging from Gibraltar Reservoir out to four miles offshore in a boat, Santa Barbara birders came up with an impressive final species total of 198 [see page 3 for complete list]. Although several count results have not yet been compiled, it looks as if we'll be number five in the nation behind California communities Pt. Reyes 201, Moss Landing 202, Morro Bay 203, and of course Freeport, Texas with the highest total of 213.

This year's count uncovered several rare, out-of-range species. Flycatchers stole the show in Goleta with a scissortailed flycatcher and a tropical kingbird at UCSB, and a dusky-capped flycatcher in a little

capped flycatcher in a little park near El Rancho School. Other unusual birds were five brant, four Ross's geese, a snow goose, a ferruginous hawk, a peregrine falcon, a yellow-bellied sapsucker,

two white-winged doves and an American redstart. The hepatic tanager is back for its 11th year at Rocky Nook Park!

Despite the relatively favorable weather conditions, there were a number of birds we regularly get on the count that were missed this year. Cause for concern were: no bluewinged teal, no black-shouldered kite, no prairie falcon, no pygmy-owl, no dipper, no Townsend's solitaire and no mountain chickadee. Other species seemed to be at all-time lows in numbers of individuals seen. Some of this is due to the slow recovery from previous drought years, but it also reflects the gradual habitat loss for

birds throughout Santa Barbara
County, particularly along the
south coast.

Saturday, Feb. 6: Christmas Count Rare Bird Chase Half-day. Clay-colored sparrow, black skimmer, Scott's oriole, hepatic tanager, tropical kingbird, dusky-capped flycatcher and scissor-tailed flycatcher will be sought at their known locations in Santa Barbara and Goleta. Reauthorizing the Endangered Species Act

A Grassroots Organizing Workshop hosted by the Audubon Society

February 6, 1993 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Carlsbad Safety Center 2560 Orion Way, Carlsbad, CA

A special all-day meeting focusing on the Endangered Species Act (E.S.A.). The goal of the meeting is to increase grassroots participation in the E.S.A. reauthorization campaign. Audubon staff from Washington, DC and the Western Regional Office, representatives from allied conservation groups, local activists, and representatives from federal agencies who deal with the E.S.A. have been invited to take part.

Conservation Notes

- ♦ Goleta Valley. The Board of Supervisors will hold hearings later this month or early March on the new Goleta Land Use Element update (completed last December). This is generally an excellent document for preserving open space, habitat, wetlands, creeks, viable agriculture and the mountain areas. We ask you to send a postcard or phone call to your individual Supervisor urging approval of the Goleta Element as is; lobbyists for developers will attempt to gut it.
- ◆ Goleta Coastal. The Supervisors will hear a proposal from a syndicate called SW Diversified (Chicago & Ontario land development investors) for the SB/Ellwood Shores area along the northwest Goleta coast. The EIR listed many Class One impacts for its effect on vernal pools, monarch butterfly roosts, threatened bird habitat, loss of open space, etc. The developers will mount a massive PR blitz; the Planning Commission has recommended denial. Audubon supports the efforts of Save Ellwood Shores to reduce the project's scale. Again, write or phone your favorite Supervisor.
- ◆ C.R.E.F. The Coastal Resource Enhancement Fund is "guilt money" the energy industry gives the County to offset pollution impacts in the coastal zone; its intent is to buy, preserve or improve coastal lands the politicians try to use it all over the place to subsidize their own depleted budgets. Don't let them do it! Please write to Ms. Melanie Hale, RMD CREF Coordinator, 1226 Anacapa Street, Suite 2, to register your support for helping Wayne Ferren acquire more land in the Carpinteria Salt Marsh wetland, or your favorite other piece of sensitive coastal property. You have until March.
- ♦ E.S.A. The Endangered Species Act may come up for a reauthorization vote this year. If any chapter members know Congressmen Huffington or Gallegley, please write or phone them to let them know that National Audubon considers this the foremost piece of environmental legislation this year. Ask them to vote yes. The many "threatened" and "endangered" species of Santa Barbara will thank you.
- ◆ To Park, or Not? The SB County Park Dept. is soliciting "public input" on future uses of the spectacular coastal bluffs area between Ellwood Shores and the proposed Hyatt Hotel (Haskell's Beach). The County wants to pave and develop this fine open space/hiking/birding area for "active recreation." If you wish to see the Conner/Knill property maintained as open park space (its current condition), please write or phone Colleen Lund, SB County Parks Dept., 610 Mission Canyon Rd., Santa Barbara, 93105 (568-2461), to express your opinion. Or attend one of the ongoing public meetings in Goleta.
