The first Santa Barbara Audubon Society's MAPS banding season concluded in the afternoon of August 1st. On that fateful day the loyal MAPS volunteers bid a tearful adieu to those early morning alarm clock awakenings, pre-dawn work calls, and the cheerful camaraderie of the bird banding station. Many of our tenacious and talented volunteers put in an eight-hour day at the MAPS station (beginning at 5 AM) and then went on to work a full day at their paid jobs (wow!!). From March until August, Audubon volunteers set up the MAPS station, tirelessly ran the net lines, extricated entangled birds from mistnets (we all quickly learned to dread finding Common Yellowthroats in the nets, those unsurpassed masters of the double-trammeled, spin-twist knot) and humored me while I droned on endlessly about molt, feather wear, and aging birds in the hand.



To date, we have captured 40 species of birds at the Atascadero Creek MAPS site. In total, 388 birds were banded and 44 banded birds were recaptured during this year's spring-summer banding season. The following species were captured and banded at Atascadero Creek between March 3 - May 1 (MAPS training sessions) and May 1 - August 1, 1999 (official MAPS banding season):

CALIFORNIA CONDORS Reported Near Painted Cave!

Ten Condors and a Golden Eagle were reported to have been seen in the Painted Cave area in mid-September by a Painted Cave resident.

Jan Hamber, Condor Biologist at the Natural History Museum, said that condors easily travel great distances and might indeed have been seen at Painted Cave. A total of 49 California Condors have been returned to the wilds; 20 in our area, 20 in Arizona and 9 in Big Sur.

The Santa Barbara Audubon Society would like to express gratitude to the Goleta Sanitary District for their gracious cooperation with birders wishing to see the rare Curlew Sandpiper. The Curlew Sandpiper has since moved on, but thank you Goleta Sanitary District for your generous support of our local birders!

Devereux Slough Margin Restoration Project Coal Oil Point Reserve by Darlene Chirman

Santa Barbara Audubon began its volunteer assistance of the Coal Oil Point (COP) Enhancement Project funded by the Coastal Resources Grant Program on August 29, to restore the lagoon margin and protect valuable bird habitat. The Devereux Slough ecosystem is especially rich in bird diversity, and harbors sensitive bird species. Devereux Slough supports the western-most population of Belding's Savannah Sparrows, and large numbers of migrant and wintering gulls, ducks, terns and shorebirds utilize the open water, sand bars or mud channels.

The first part of the project is restoration and enhancement of a half mile of lagoon margin along the road to Coal Oil Point and Cliff House. This will buffer the slough from the road - protecting water quality from run-off and screening the slough from headlights. The present "Hottentot fig", or iceplant, is an African native plant which has invaded natural areas an unfortunately displaced native plants and provides poor wildlife habitat. The native salt marsh vegetation--such as Pickleweed and Frankenia, and Coastal sage scrub shrubs--such as Coast goldenbush, Suaeda, and California sagebrush provide food resources for several marsh-dependent butterflies, and foraging for Belding's Savannah sparrows.

Several Audubon volunteers assisted the Reserve staff in covering the iceplant along the lagoon margin with black plastic to kill the iceplant. Herbicides are not being used, as they might damage sensitive wildlife. When winter rains begin, several hundred native plants will be planted along the margin. The existing salt marsh plants are expected to creep up the banks once the iceplant has been eradicated.

The project will also provide a path along the lagoon margin, and improved parking turnouts with informational kiosks for birders. Audubon will assist in the design and content of these signs.

Other aspects of the Coal Oil Point Enhancement Project will improve access for birdwatchers during the seasons when the bird activity is highest.

Regular Restoration Volunteer Workdays will be held. Come out and help! You can make a valuable contribution, and have fun with like-minded folks in a beautiful setting. We'll be there October 10 and November 14. By November we should be planting. 

not known to currently breed on the southern Santa Barbara County coastal plain (birds so designated were primarily banded prior to the beginning of the MAPS period).

Other species for which we collected sufficient evidence to indicate on-site nesting include: Green Heron, Mallard, White-tailed Kite, Cooper's Hawk, Great-horned Owl, Anna's Hummingbird, and Allen's Hummingbird.

Some of the more noteworthy accomplishments of this year's MAPS season include the confirmation of White-tailed Kite, Cooper's Hawk, Warbling Vireo and Wilson's Warbler as on-site breeders. Also of interest was

the nearly continuous presence of Willow Flycatchers on the MAPS site from mid May to mid June. Five of these Willow Flycatchers were captured and banded.

Overall, this first banding season was a resounding success and lots of learning and good fun was had by all! San Jose Creek Restoration Project Update by Darlene Chirman

Volunteers have participated in the monthly work days on San Jose Creek, sponsored by Santa Barbara Audubon and Santa Barbara Urban Creeks Council. Tasks include planting native plants, removing invasive non-native plants, watering and weeding new plantings, and picking up trash. During the planting season, October to March, we planted oak understory with native grasses, hummingbird sage, snowberry and wood mint. A hillside was transformed from the ornamental Fountain grass to native bunchgrass plus monkeyflower and blue-eyed grass. Sandbar willow was planted to stabilize a creek bank, and Sycamore trees were planted to succeed storm-downed Eucalyptus trees. The volunteers have contributed to improved water quality and wildlife habitat. This year, we hope to expand the project with additional funding, to include school children and community groups in hands-on restoration.

Monthly work days are generally held on the last Saturday of the month. We meet at the Berkeley footbridge at Merida Drive at 9 AM and work until noon.

To tour the restoration sites, come out on Sunday, October 17th; meet at the Berkeley footbridge at 9 AM. Brian Trautwein of the EDC, formerly the Executive Director of Urban Creeks Council, will lead the tour, which will be followed by restoration plantings. This will be the monthly volunteer day, shifted from the usual last Saturday in honor of Creek Week.
