

The SBAS Board of Directors met for our Annual Retreat in August. We use the Retreat to get better acquainted with new board members. Welcome to Beth Price, Treasurer; Ginny Turner, Secretary; and At Large/Outreach members Victoria Harvey, Christine Cowles and Anna Nicholas.

We reviewed chapter activities of the past year and compared them with the annual goals set last year. We are proud of our accomplishments:

- Snowy Plover Docent Program: First docents trained and on the beach at Coal Oil Point Reserve (see article on page 6).
- Marine Conservation: Letters of support and representatives at public meetings for no-take reserves in the Channel Island National Marine Sanctuary. Fish & Game Commission to make a decision after the first of the year.
- Gaviota Coast Protection: Arroyo Hondo Ranch acquisition goal is nearly reached by the Land Trust of S. B. County. SBAS issued a challenge grant to members to donate, and matched with a contribution of \$2000.

- Clean Creeks and Beaches: Measure B passed, which we endorsed, to raise the bed tax for funding watershed water quality improvements and restoration. Project Clean Water active, including opening of the Watershed Resource Center—we participated in the Advisory Committee. Southern California Wetland Recovery Project has a local Task Force, and San Jose Creek Restoration about to begin a new habitat restoration phase, with our support. Continued Goleta Slough habitat restoration.
- Eyes In The Sky: SBAS's education bird program, which takes unreleaseable raptors to classrooms and local groups as conservation ambassadors has expanded.
- Increased coordination of newsletter, programs, and field trips with science, conservation, and educational goals.

For the coming year, our goals include:

♦ Snowy Plover Protection: Coal Oil Point Snowy Plover Plan approval and comment of UCFWS Recovery Plan with EDC's expertise. Expand and establish funding for Snowy Plover Docent Program.



- ♦ Ellwood/Devereux Watershed Conservation: Support regional open space and natural resource protection plan. Ensure that development plans are consistent with Coastal Act and Endangered Species Act with EDC's expertise.
- Gaviota Coast Protection: Emphasis on protection, encourage involvement of Audubon-CA and national in support of the biodiversity of the coast.

- ♦ Marine Conservation: Continue our efforts.
- ♦ Watershed Conservation/ Restoration: Continue our collaborative efforts with Project Clean Water, Wetland Recovery Project, and other groups.



- ♦ Eyes In The Sky: Expand program, and seek funding to underwrite presentations to low-income children.
- ♦ Membership Drive: Recruit 80 new members this year. Changing roles of National Audubon recruiting members less and reduction of dues sharing to chapters except for locally-recruited members.
- ♦ Outreach: New Outreach Committee will assist the chapter with media coverage so our efforts are better known in the community, better communication with members, and fundraising. We are initiating an *e-mail notification list* of members who wish to be alerted of chapter activities; and enhancing our website.
- ♦ Collaboration: We wish to collaborate more with other non-profit organizations, co-sponsoring events and supporting conservation of natural resources.
- ♦ Volunteers: We want to include more members and the community in our programs and projects.

We are not taking on additional new projects this year, but hope to strengthen our current programs and fund the Environmental Defense Center representation. We'd love to have your help—let us know your interests. We elicit your feedback on how you think the chapter is doing, and if you support our directions, or think we should have other priorities. Contact any Board member with your comments.



"Butterflies and Moths of the Salt Marsh" Dr. Cristina Sandoval, Speaker Wednesday, October 24th

r. Cristina Sandoval, Director of Coal Oil Point Reserve, part of the UC National Reserve System, will discuss local butterfly and moth species in the native marsh habitat. Her talk will

also include results of a study of how local species use the resources of the Carpinteria Salt Marsh Reserve. Species that depend on the salt marsh plants to feed the caterpillars, such as the Western Pygmy Blue and the Wandering Skipper, also depend on the plants growing at the upland edge of the marsh for adult nectaring. A trained entomologist, Dr. Sandoval will explain the significance of this study relative to local restoration projects.

"Birds of the Central Coast" Jim Greaves, Speaker Wednesday, November 28th (note special date)

I nterested in the art of photographing and documenting birds in their natural habitat? Then join us for an enlightening and lively evening with noted photographer Jim Greaves.

Jim is a Least Bell's Vireo specialist. He has also developed an extensive and diverse photographic file of many central coast bird species, taken in hard-to-find locales. Jim's most recent find came last year when he found the first nest in several decades of Southwest Willow Flycatcher on the Santa Clara River. Jim's interest in wildlife photography and the study of birds led him to survey San Miguel Island Song Sparrows and census birds on several Channel Islands for the Museum of Natural History. Aided by a grant from SBAS in 1979 he began 3 studies of the Bell's Vireos at Gibraltar, the latest taken during 1997-2001. For over 10 years Jim has also done vireo studies for the US Fish and Wildlife Service and the California Department of Fish and Game. In the Santa Ynez and Ventura areas he has been involved with cowbird control and monitoring. His work includes surveys for Least Bell's Vireos, Southwest Willow Flycatchers, California Gnatcatchers and other wildlife. Perhaps surprisingly, Jim has found flycatcher nests in amongst invasive Arundo Donax, among other sites in southern California.

First Snowy Plover Docents Trained and on the Beach! By Kendy Radasky

A syou may have read in the last issue of ET, the long-awaited Snowy Plover Docent Program at Coal Oil Point Reserve is off to a great start. This program has been over a year in the making—a collaborative effort between SBAS and Coal Oil Point Reserve—and has been made possible by a generous donation from a very special SBAS member, Mr. Gerald Franklin.

Our first Docent Training, held from 9 AM to 2 PM on August 11th and attended by 8 aspiring docents, was an extremely positive experience for all

involved. **Cristina Sandoval**, the Reserve's Manager, began the training by teaching everyone a bit about the history of the Reserve, and the recent history of the politics involving the plovers at Sand's Beach. I followed with a brief slide show highlighting the natural history and biology of the Western Snowy Plover, and then **Kevin Lafferty**, the co-caretaker of the Reserve and a biologist at UCSB, presented data from his year-long study on human disturbance of plover activity on Sand's Beach.

We had a great presentation on "What it means to be a Docent" by **Ed Easton**, a veteran of designing and fine-tuning docent programs. Then we went through the Docent Manual (or the 'Docent Bible', as some like to call it) with the Plover Docent Coordinator, **Jennifer Stroh**. We talked about the plans and goals for plover management on Coal Oil Point Reserve and the challenges we face by working to integrate the protection of wildlife and natural areas with public access. Finally, we ended the training with some role-playing on the beach, and some new docents tried their hands at public interaction—asking some dog-walkers to please leash their dogs.

Overall, we are very pleased with the presence we have created on the beach at Coal Oil Point Reserve, and with the way we have been able to integrate the docent program into the general educational plan regarding plovers at the Reserve. The awareness of the presence and importance of the Snowy Plover among beach-goers has increased dramatically. Most of the beach-goers have been more than happy to help protect the plovers by leashing their dogs, respecting the boundaries of the fenced plover exclosure, and playing their games of catch and Frisbee a little farther down the beach. In fact, many docents have been approached by curious visitors to the beach who want to know more about the plovers, and perhaps take a look at some through binoculars. The plovers, and indeed, many other bird species, seem to be benefiting from the docents' watchful eyes.

Does this program sound like something you might like to become involved with? We need more docents! We would love to train you or someone you know to become a Snowy Plover Docent, and we just happen to have another training coming up! The next training session is planned for **Saturday**, **October 6th**, from **9 AM to 2 PM**. Ellwood-Devereux Regional Plan By Darlene Chirman



A regional plan for open space, natural resource protection, and residential development was announced by **Gail Marshall**, the University of California at Santa Barbara, and the developer of "Monarch Point" on the Ellwood Mesa. The Board of

Supervisors authorized Planning & Development to proceed with development of a master plan that could protect the coastal bluffs on the Ellwood Mesa, the University's "South Parcel" and "West Campus Bluffs." Public access would be evaluated on a regional scale.

The master plan would look at a "land swap" with Santa Barbara Shores County Park so the residential development would be close to Hollister Ave. in order to preserve the more sensitive habitat of the coastal bluffs as open space.

The trade-off would be consideration of building on areas designated wetlands and Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Areas north of Devereux Creek, on both the current parkland, and on University-owned land.

The Coal Oil Point Reserve is proposed to be included in the regional planning effort. **SBAS** has concerns that this might delay the adoption of much needed protection for the Snowy Plover, and the Coal Oil Point Management Plan. For several years our chapter has been urging the University to proceed with both the Plover Plan and the COPR Management Plan.

The possible creation of the City of Goleta adds to the complexity of the equation, as some of these areas would be within the city jurisdiction.

SBAS supports the regional planning effort, but have some concerns about potential impacts to the Snowy Plover and wetlands, and delays in COPR management plan adoption. The Environmental Defense Center has been representing us on University housing issues in the Devereux watershed for several years, and recently was retained to assist



with Snowy Plover Protection issues. So with the Regional Master Plan proceeding, EDC will assist **SBAS** in ensuring that the Coastal Act and Endangered Species Act are followed.
