Every year this wonderful effort on the part of 150 local and out-of-town birders is enough to keep Santa Barbara in the top five Christmas Counts in number of species sighted in the United States.

On the evening of Count Day, please join us at the compilation dinner at the **Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History** in Fleischmann Auditorium. The potluck dinner begins promptly at 6:00 p.m. and the compilation countdown at 7:00 p.m. Please bring your favorite salad, main dish, or dessert to share. If your group includes out-of-towners, they may contribute drinks, bread, chips, etc. Please bring your own service.

This year's count compiler will be Joan Lentz, assisted by Karen Bridgers and Joan and George Hardie. Chris Walden has graciously agreed to take participants' sign-ups. Please fill out the coupon on page 2 or call or e-mail Chris to sign up.




"Eyes In The Sky"

We have a special treat for our December program! EYES IN THE SKY will present a program at the Community Environmental Council's new Watershed Resource Center at Hendry's Beach. EITS, a project of the SBAS, brings living wild hawks and owls, species native to our area—directly to schools and community groups for close-up and personal encounters. Due to human impact, these Species Ambassadors are no longer capable of surviving in the wild. They are powerful messengers who help people to experience directly the magnificence of our normally elusive wild neighbors, and to understand how deeply human actions affect them—for better or worse.

This program will be free of charge, and families are welcome.

"The Gaviota Coast" Sierra Club Speakers Wednesday, January 23th





In addition to being a key marine transition zone, Gaviota is one of the most important terrestrial transition zones between northern and southern California, resulting in rich biodiversity and a large amount of unique species found nowhere else. More than 40 sensitive (state or federally endangered, threatened or protected) vertebrate species inhabit the coast, including the California Condor, California Red-legged Frog, Western Snowy Plover, Southern California Steelhead, Tidewater Goby, Peregrine Falcon, Southern Sea Otter, California Least Tern and California Brown Pelican. This presentation is guaranteed to be an excellent learning opportunity about not only the incredible diversity of birds on the Gaviota Coast, but the unique habitats that support them and the ways in which you can help preserve and protect these resources...forever.



Morro Bay Winter Bird Festival January 18th - January 21st

The return of wintering birds to Morro Bay is celebrated each year. Located on the central California coast, the area is known for its natural beauty and is a globally important bird area on the Pacific Flyway. Dozens of festival events appeal to all birders and to persons interested in Morro Bay, a designated national and state estuary. Birders spotted 207 different species during the 2001 Festival.

We will again feature:

- Field trips-on land and sea led by expert birders.
- Workshops on a variety of topics.
- Open hours at Sweet Springs Nature Preserve, Audubon Overlook, and the Elfin Forest.
- Vendors who focus on birding equipment and information.

Binoculars are useful for enjoyment of birds, but if you don't have a pair please call the trip leader and we'll lend you a spare. Trips are free unless noted.

Point Mugu Naval Air Station near Oxnard, Ventura County Sunday, December 2nd, 7:45 a.m.

Target Birds: Waterfowl, rails, egrets, shorebirds, Vermilion Flycatcher Paul Keller (coordinator), 968-7804, wrentit@gte.net Reservations required due to limited space.

We will carpool from the Andree Clark Bird Refuge parking area. From the east take 101 north to Cabrillo Blvd (left lane exit just past Montecito). Turn left on Cabrillo Blvd and right on Los Patos Way. Parking area on left. From the west take 101 south to Los Patos Way (after Milpas exit) and turn right into parking area.

The trip will begin at Mugu's Pizza across from the Main Gate off Hwy 1 at Wood Rd at 9:00 a.m. If you want to meet us at Mugu's Pizza please let me know beforehand. To reserve your space please call or email me no later than Thursday November 15th. If you get my machine, E-NUN-CI-ATE CLEAR-LY and SLOW-LY, spelling as necessary, your last name, first name, middle initial, social security number, phone number, and, if you are under 18 years old, your age. Limit of 25 people. We need at least 15 participants for the trip so barring medical emergency or death in the immediate family, if you sign up show up. You must be at least 12 years old.

A base naturalist will lead us about the base until about noon. Bring photo ID, lunch and water. Dress in layers for sun, fog, wind or showers. Limited walking. Scopes useful but cameras and video equipment are not allowed.

We will carpool from the Andree Clark Bird Refuge parking lot. From the east take 101 north to Cabrillo Blvd (left lane exit just past town of Montecito). Turn left on Cabrillo and right on Los Patos Way. Parking lot on left. From the west take 101 south to Los Patos off ramp (after Milpas exit) and turn right into Bird Refuge parking lot. If you want to meet us at the Game Preserve (private and normally off limits) take 101 to Camarillo. Exit Las Posas and go south to Hueneme Rd and turn right. Go west and turn left on Casper Rd. About a mile after the left bend on Casper Rd turn right into the game preserve and park by the green bungalows by 8:15 a.m. Bring water and snack. We won't have to walk far from the cars for any of our several stops. Scopes useful. Trip over by noon.

Come see both game and non-game birds in a superb habitat that a private group of hunters has created.

OWL-O-WEEN A Great Success! By Gabriele Drozdowski

A lmost a hundred people participated in our second annual OWL-O-WEEN at the Botanic Garden on October 27th. The event began at sunset with owl crafts for children, and a pizza/salad dinner amongst owl-carved pumpkins. As it became dark SBAS Board Member and writer Sheila Goldburgh-Johnson set up the mood for a mysterious moonlight hike by reading two wonderful owl poems. Four groups now set out toward the canyon guided by their moonlighting wizard guides—SBAS volunteers Apieh Claybrook, Christine Cowles, Paul Keller, Kendy Radasky and SBBG docents. Each group visited four mysterious stations—an owl display station in the gazebo—complete with owl talons, feathers, wings, pellets, and stuffed owls; next a real owl feather hunt on a moonlit meadow; then a live Great Horned Owl (Max) in the Redwoods where Great Horned Owls have nested in the past, and a real Western Screech Owl (Otus) on the other side of the canyon. Arriving back in the courtyard the hikers received cookies and were entertained with a short slide show about Santa Barbara's 10 owl species. This concluded the evening, and big smiles were noticed.


