Watershed Restoration Update

This has been a rewarding year for the volunteers and interns assisting SBAS with habitat restoration in wetlands and creeks. Our Goleta Slough restoration projects are nearing completion. Two years of installation of native plants along the slough margins of Tecolotito Creek has established a native plant community we hope will entice Belding's Savannah Sparrow and Pygmy Blue Butterfly to utilize the site. The Atascadero

Creek bike path project is completed. Our partnership with the Weed Management Area has eradicated Pampas grass from hundreds of acres of Goleta Slough. We have been watering the new plants at three sites this summer, given the dry year, and the plants are thriving.

We have assisted the Arroyo Hondo Preserve to initiate a riparian restoration project. An abandoned avocado orchard hugs the creek, home to endangered Steelhead trout. The avocado trees have served as "nurse trees," as perching birds dropped acorns and bay seeds, and defecated seeds from fruits of shrubs such as coffeeberry, bitter gooseberry and redberry. Young riparian forests are coming up under the old avocado trees. Volunteers have been removing the avocado trees and non-native weeds such castor been and fennel. Instant riparian forest is the result, seen in one day's work!

The Southern California Wetland Recovery project has awarded **SBAS** a grant of \$28, 820 to restore a 1.25 acre section of slough margin along the north side of Devereux Slough. We will be working closely with **Dr. Cris Sandoval**, the Director of Coal Oil Point Reserve, to transform this wetland and transitional habitat to native species over the next two years. We hope you'll come out to help us! See the Restoration Schedule on page 4. When you drive by the southern edge of the slough, you can see the transformation from ice plant two years ago to the thriving native plant cover today. Audubon volunteers helped in that successful restoration.

SBAS joined the recently-created Mission Creek Restoration Partnership. We are looking forward to a major habitat restoration project on the grounds of the Museum of Natural History now in the planning stages. To highlight this project, and the high biodiversity and geologic history of Mission Creek, part of Creek Week this year (October 6-12) will be a "Mission Creek Expo" to be held at the Museum's Fleischmann's Auditorium on Wednesday, October 9.

Do participate in Creek Week this year, or come out to volunteer at the Restoration Workday. Celebrate our creeks and wetlands! Thanks to all who have made a contribution to improved wildlife habitat and water quality.


Eyes In Sky Update

Since January 2000, EYES IN THE SKY's wildlife messen gers (five birds of prey native to our area) have presented 314 programs to over 10,500 Santa Barbara area residents. 192 of these programs took place in 38 local schools. Others took place at Earth Day, S.B. Museum of Natural History, the S.B. Botanic Garden, Community Environmental Council, Senior Centers, and the Alisal Guest Ranch.

Our birds' physical presence and unique stories of survival following conflict with human activities educate about the impacts of human actions - both good and bad, and build respect and understanding for local wildlife species and their habitats.

EITS has made a special effort to reach elementary school students in low-income neighborhoods where children have much to gain from connecting with nature. 107 of EITS' school presentations were provided free of charge to such schools.

This year EITS expanded with its new MEET YOUR WILD NEIGHBOR program, a five-week, state science-standard based series of lessons for students in low-income area elementary schools. Eight classrooms participated. The feedback from teachers and students was tremendous! This new school year EITS plans to offer this new program to 23 additional classrooms at Adams, Cesar Chavez, Cleveland and McKinley schools. cies and non-profit groups, has brought negotiation, legislation, and litigation to Mono Lake's support and achieved a great deal in the fight process.

Please join Frances Spivy-Weber, Executive Director of Policy, as she updates us on the natural history and current struggles around Mono Lake. Fall Exhibit at the Wildling Art Museum to feature Audubon Prints

In keeping with its mission to promote an understanding and appreciation of America's wilderness through art, the Wildling Art Museum will be showing the prints of our nation's best known artist-naturalist, John James Audubon. The exhibition, entitled "John James Audubon: American Woodsman," will continue through December 1. The exhibition will include approximately 23 original prints of North American birds and mammals studied, drawn and painted by Audubon. It will include hand-colored engravings of the Canada Warbler, White-Crowned Sparrow, California Condor, Black Billed Magpie, Passenger Pigeon and Carolina Parakeet. Some of these birds are now extinct, and so these works of art provide a unique record of their appearance.

The Museum is located at 2329 Jonata Street in Los Olivos (between Mattei's Tavern and St. Mark's Episcopal Church). Public hours are Wednesday through Friday 1-5, Saturday and Sunday 11-5. Admission is free. For more information please call 688-1082.


Santa Barbara Audubon Field Trips

Guide to Birds of the Salton Sea

The Salton Sea is one of California's best and most popular birding areas. It hosts over 400 species, including many international migratory birds. The Salton Sea also serves as a crucial watering and feeding area along the International Flyway, linking Latin American wintering areas with summer forage and breeding areas in the western states and Canada.

Audubon members already know that the Salton Sea has become badly degraded over the last 50 years. By the 1980s and early '90s, the challenges facing the Salton Sea appeared so great that many feared that the sea was doomed. Thanks to inspired leadership by the late Sonny Bono, as the area's Congressman, and more recently by his wife Mary, the Salton Sea has become an Audubon California focal point for restoration efforts. International and multi-agency research consortia, including Audubon, are working to first stabilize the Salton Sea, and then implement a long-term recovery plan.

Anyone interested in the history, geology, hydrology, and, most of all, the glorious bird and wildlife of the Salton Sea area should consider adding the brand new **Guide to Birds of the Salton Sea** to your holiday shopping list. This 300 page labor of love by Barbara W. Massey and Richard Zembal is published by the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum, and dedicated to legendary Cal State Long Beach ornithologist and Salton Sea guru Charles Collins.

Amazingly, this lively well written guide appears to be the first modern full-length book to focus on the Salton Sea's natural bounty. At just \$24.95, equipped with sturdy covers and quick-reference appendices at the rear, this book would enhance the library of any California nature-lover or intrepid birder. - 4. Jennifer Stroh. Jennifer is the first-year coordinator of the very successful Snowy Plover Docent Program at UCSB's Coal Oil Point Reserve. She has published an excellent Training Manual and Program for the almost 100 docents at the beach. Jennifer has also worked hard to write grants that have been providing much-needed continuous funding.
- 5. Kendy Radasky. Science Committee member Kendy has done a great job arranging for our judges and awards at the Science Fair held by the public schools. She was a coordinator with Jennifer, working with the fencing around the Snowy Plover nesting site to help protect the fledglings from dogs (who legally must be on the leash). For the first time in 30 years the Plovers nested and produced 14 fledglings at Sands Beach!
