# **Watershed Restoration Update**

Interns and volunteers have completed the first season of planting native plants at SBAS's restoration site on the north shore of Devereux Slough. This project helps in the restoration of Coal Oil Point Reserve.

The Tecolotito Creek Restoration Project is officially completed. Take a walk from Goleta Beach Park, on the bike path under the 217 bridge, with great views of Goleta Slough. All along the slough margin before and after the bike bridge is the restoration area of high marsh and transitional plant communities. We will occasionally return to this site for some plant maintenance—weeding of non-native plants to ensure establishment of native vegetation.

SBAS also helps recruit volunteers for the Arroyo Hondo Preserve. This incredible site, the "jewel of the Gaviota Coast," is managed by the Land Trust of Santa Barbara County as a nature and historical preserve. It contains hiking trails and Arroyo Hondo Creek, which is home to sensitive birds and creek inhabitants—including Steelhead Trout, Southwest Pond Turtles and Tidewater Gobies.

Stewardship makes a tremendous difference in the ecological health of our creeks and coastal wetlands. Especially in urban areas, with public use and surrounded by weed sources, "letting nature take its course" is allowing further degradation. It is also rewarding to be outdoors, watching the wildlife. As an example, the last week of April restoration volunteers watched Cliff Swallows gathering mud from the edge of Goleta Slough for nest-building under the bike bridge.

You may have wondered about my role in the restoration and the rest of the chapter activities. As President and member of the Conservation Committee. I volunteer for Board meetings, attend public hearings to testify, write comment letters on local policies and development projects to protect local natural resources. In addition, I am hired and paid as an independent contractor when I work for SBAS as Project Manager for habitat restoration projects—and paid only with grants with specific budget allocations for a biologist to plan and oversee these restoration projects. The Board and Conservation Committee select projects that will support our chapter mission of enhancing wildlife habitat. I also work for other non-profits such as the Land Trust and Community Environmental Council as a professional Habitat Restoration Ecologist, restoring natural areas around Santa Barbara, Goleta, and the Gaviota Coast.

The 782 acre Preserve, now managed by the Land Trust for Santa Barbara County, encompasses rich birding habitats, particularly along the riparian corridor from the beach to the mountains.

If you cannot make the field trip you might enjoy birding on your own. The Preserve is open the first and third weekends of each month at no charge, but you must make a reservation by calling 567-1115.

#### Valley View Ranch Field Trip Report

The May 24 field trip to Valley View Ranch, located near Santa Paula, was well attended by approximately 25 birders and we were not disappointed! I personally viewed 27 species of birds including my first Blue Grosbeak plus one large gopher snake. Other birders saw and heard many more species. We hiked and birded a nature preserve that is controlled by the Santa Clara River Preserve. It is a wonderful area for birds because it is very diverse. It has water and both tree and large scrub bush habitats plus orchards and open fields. Avid birders have placed many nesting boxes in this area and they are used by

a variety of species including Tree Swallows, Ash-throated Flycatchers and Oak Titmice. We also saw two Bullock's Oriole nests and a Bell's Vireo nest with three eggs in it.

We were treated to viewing a Brown-headed Cowbird trap. Since the cowbird does not build its own nest but lays its eggs in the nest of other birds this results in the other birds either losing all or part of its brood. Jim Greaves, our tour leader, reported that when the Cowbirds are trapped the other bird's offspring are increased by as much as 20%. Cowbirds are not native to California and they, along with the European Starling, although a part of nature, are considered pests. The Cowbird cage trap was very similar in theory to insect and bee traps but at a much larger scale. The birds can get in but cannot (in most cases) figure out how to get out again. A few female cowbirds are placed in the trap to lure other cowbirds in. The trap is inspected everyday and, because there is food and water, many other birds species enter the trap but they are released.

The half-day session ended by returning to our cars just in time to view two White-tailed Kites perched together on a utility pole. Another great day birding!

#### South Coast Watershed Resource Center

**Program Updates**

Wednesday, September 24, 5:00 pm At South Coast Watershed Resource Center, Arroyo Burro Beach (Please note special time and place)

The South Coast has approximately 50 short, steep watersheds that start in the Santa Ynez Mountains, flow through the foothills and coastal plain, and ultimately empty into the Pacific. When it rains, large volumes of water quickly move through our watersheds—flushing pollutants and threatening to flood the people living in the natural flood plains. Managing these watersheds to assure high water quality is an issue of primary concern to South Coast residents.

The SCWRC was built at the request of the County in response to this concern. It makes the connection between healthy watersheds and each of our own personal habits. Features include a native plant area, an ocean view deck, a wetlab for testing

water samples and a special area for the building a tomol—the traditional redwood plank canoe used by the Chumash.


Come join us at the SCWRC. Karen Feeney, Community Program Director, will give us a tour and update on current conservation and education programs. After Karen's talk we will tour the estuary and surrounding area. Darlene Chirman will point out the restoration and bios wale projects installed and planned, and Mary Thompson will help us identify the local birdlife.

The doors will open at 5:00 pm for snacks and informal viewing of the SCWRC. The program will start at 5:30 pm, and a tour of the restoration area and the bird walk at 6:15 pm.

## Central Coast Birding Rally, October 3 to 5

non-competitive Hobby Class Rally has been added this year. It is friendly, fun and caters to all levels of experience. And it is free! Participants will bird 3 Central Coast Birding Trail sites to add to the composite rally bird list, while at the same time looking for a targeted specialty bird at each site: a Heerman's Gull at Ocean Park, an Oak Titmouse at Miguelito Park and a Wrentit at La Purisima Mission. All 3 species must be seen and members of all teams that see all 3 will receive a prize.



A rally reception with hors doeuvres and a raffle will be held Friday evening. The rally itself will be Saturday morning with the Hobby Class in the Lompoc Valley and the Open Class in the Santa Maria Valley. In the afternoon a Santa Maria style bar-b-cue with an auction of birding related items will be held at Los Alamos County Park. On Sunday a Big Site will take place at Nojoqui Falls County Park with a beverage and grilled hot dogs being served around noon. All of these events are free.

## Rancho Guadalupe Dunes Preserve

Santa Maria River mouth, west of Santa Maria

Saturday, August 16, 7:30 am

(at carpool place - drivers may appreciate gas money)

**Target birds:** Fall shorebirds, gulls, terns and seabirds

Take 101 to the Storke/Glen Annie exit in Goleta. Proceed south on Storke Rd to the parking area just east of the Jack-in-the-Box that is located near the southeast corner of Storke and Hollister. Car pool from here. Or meet us at the Preserve at 9:00 am. To get to the Preserve take 101 north to Santa Maria and exit on 166 and go west to the river mouth. Proceed through the Preserve entrance and continue on to the beach parking lot.

Wear boots or shoes for sand, soft mud and water. Dress in warm

layers for chilly foggy breeze. Scopes very useful. Back by about 1:30 so bring water and maybe a snack for lunch.

We are birding an area normally off limits during this, the Snowy Plover breeding season, so take advantage of this unique situation and join us.

Take 101 to the Glen Annie/Storke exit. Proceed south on Storke Rd to its end and turn right onto Slough Rd. Go 0.1 mile and turn left onto West Campus Lane. Go 0.1 mile to the Orfalea Family Children's Center and park between the Center and the horse stable.

If time permits we'll walk around the slough first going to the beach. Wear shoes for walking on trails, sand and maybe tar. If you're not up for a long walk, join us anyway and turn back whenever you've reach half your limit. Bring water if it's warm. Scopes are useful if you don't mind carrying them for this long walk. I'll bring mine. Trip over by 7:30.

Show your appreciation for the people who cleaned this area last Saturday as part of the Coastal Clean-Up Day by joining us for this sunset bird walk. The last few years the birding was so good we barely made it to the beach.
