## THE 118TH AUDUBON CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

reparations for Audubon's annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC), to be held on Saturday, December 30, 2017, are well underway as compilers Rebecca Coulter, Liz Muraoka, and Joan Murdoch welcome Libby Patten to the coordinating team. Former compiler Jared Dawson has moved to Northern California, where he is enjoying his new birding patch; we will greatly miss him and wish him all the best.

The 118th CBC season will see some adjustments in our site coverage, as Goleta continues to expand its housing area and the North Campus Open Space transitions from golf course to restoration area. Last winter brought some relief to drought-weary habitats, but we need our first rain of this season to bring more water. Many plants seem to have set record amounts of fruit: acorns are abundant, and the toyon berry crop looks promising, already ripening in some places. In addition, flowering trees and shrubs, plus trees that





Carving up and covering the count circle is an annual challenge, as the Santa Barbara CBC often has the highest number of field participants in the country. The keys to our success are finding the right fit for eager birders and adequate coverage for each type of habitat. Not all birders sign up for a multi-mile mountain hike, yet we must cover a vast amount of dense chaparral and steep mountain slopes. Just how many birders are too many in one group? Where do we assign eager beginners, and with which leaders? Do we have all the necessary permissions to enter private property? How can we best use current technology for reporting/recording/compiling? These are just some of the considerations that consume the minds of the compilers in December, preparing for Count Day and the surprises it always holds. Last year, the weather was our story—after many dry months, unexpected rain on Count Day added to the already grim reporting, culminating in one of our lowest species counts in years. Such is the fun of birding!

We take pride as a community in the quality of our citizen science. By participating in the CBC, you are contributing to the larger picture of wintering avian distribution throughout North America, and increasingly in Central and South America as count circles expand there.

#### A SERIES INTRODUCING THE DIRECTORS OF OUR CHAPTER

ew Treasurer Chris Mersey was literally born a world traveler, as his British diplomat parents were serving in Rome at the time of his birth. While attending school in the English countryside, Chris developed an abiding love of nature and its creatures, and as a pre-teen he joined the Royal Society for Protection of Birds, the British equivalent of the Audubon Society. After graduating from Loughborough University of Technology with a degree in banking and finance, he began a career in the banking industry.

In 1987, a work trip took Chris to New York, where he met and married his wife Cheri, eventually

becoming a US citizen. Together, they moved where work took them, most notably to Singapore for 10 years and Germany for 5, and always they took vacations that were focused on a love of wildlife. In 2011, they made a list of the things they wanted to do and see, and decided to move to California. After landing at LAX, they began driving up the coast. Santa Barbara was their second stop, and it was obvious to them this would be their eventual destination.

Since joining SBAS, Chris has been a volunteer and presenter for Eyes in the Sky, helped to cater events, agreed to house two of our EITS raptors on his property during renovations at the Museum of Natural History, and was part of the small but able team that built new temporary aviaries for all seven birds.

Chris brings training, experience, and knowledge to his post as Treasurer. He looks forward to helping SBAS reach a larger portion of the community to ensure that generations to come will have the opportunity to appreciate nature.

he Goleta Sanitary District (GSD) plant site, a well-known birding hotspot, has been very kind to the birding community, including opening the facility for our Christmas Bird Count. When the subject of their annual Open House with its Jurassic Park theme came up, it seemed natural for SBAS to support the event and conduct a photo contest as well.

On September 23, Jeff Hanson, assisted by Board members and volunteers, assembled and staffed an impressive booth. The winning contest photos provided a nice backdrop to our booth and are now on view in the GSD offices. Winners are Dave Furseth of Murietta, California and locals Betsy Mooney, Bradley Hacker, Glenn Kincaid, and Mark Holmgren.

Jayne Wamsley set up an amazing "I've Got a Bone to Pick" game about the links between dinosaurs and birds, created by this summer's Teen Program at the Museum of Natural History. Jessica Altstatt provided information on bird species seen at the GSD.

Eyes in the Sky display boards set out on the lawn provided information about our bird and programs, but the real stars of the show were our EITS birds: Kisa the Peregrine Falcon, Puku the Western Screech Owl, Ivan the Red-tailed Hawk, and Athena the Barn Owl.

## **FALL COASTAL SURVEY OF THE BROWN PELICAN**

n September 9, volunteers at coastal spots from Baja California to Washington state participated in the biannual survey of the Brown Pelican. These surveys help define the status and distribution of this iconic species, which was removed from the Endangered Species list in 2009, but whose breeding success is still of concern.

For Santa Barbara County, there were count teams at Santa Barbara Harbor and Santa Maria River Estuary. The Santa Barbara Harbor team of Joan Kent, Laurel Luby, Libby Patten, Cathy Peterson, Dennis Ringer, and Meg White counted 45 pelicans; the Santa Maria team, led by Alex Abela, counted 190. Both totals are about one quarter of that seen last fall, which could be concerning. It is not yet known if the drop resulted in part from the survey being held a month early or other factors. Typically, this species is out breeding at the Channel Islands in spring and then spends more time at

## NEWS FROM EYES IN THE SKY

A s another busy year closes, it is time to look back and reflect on changes and accomplishments. Financial support came from many individual donors, as well as grants received from the Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians Foundation and the Steinmetz Family Foundation. We were delighted to welcome Jean Schuyler as a new Aviary Sponsor.

We are also grateful to the Museum of Natural History for its support while we built temporary off-site aviaries in August and relocated our raptors over the Labor Day weekend. EITS raptors



continue to meet the public at the museum by the oak tree near Mission Creek each Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday. We will return to our usual permanent aviary after the museum's Back Yard construction projects are completed.

While we are best known for our successful children's programs, in late 2016 the Legacy Foundation Fund awarded us a grant to develop an educational program for seniors. So far, we have presented over nine programs at senior centers. We find these audiences highly interested and eager to learn about our raptors and to see them close up in a personal setting.

We continue to have 45 highly dedicated volunteers who care for the birds, present programs, and help in many other ways. Last year they gave 7,000 hours of service. With their help, EITS' education message about birds and their conservation reached over 27,400 people (an increase of 2,000 over the prior year).

We wish to thank the many friends and donors who continue to support Eyes in the Sky, not only with donations but with their time and talents. May you have a joyful holiday season.

## WESTERN SNOWY PLOVER REHABILITATION

AT THE SANTA BARBARA ZOO by Rachel Ritchason, Curator of Birds

n a chilly and overcast Sunday morning at a Ventura Beach, Debra Barringer, a federally permitted volunteer nest monitor with Ventura Audubon Society, found a newly hatched Western Snowy Plover alone in a nest, under a piece of cardboard. Three eggs had hatched, but the adult and two of the chicks were gone. Debra scoured the beach for signs of the plover family while she warmed the chick in her hands. Convinced the family had left the area, Debra reached out to the Ventura Fish and Wildlife Service. Within a few hours, the hatchling was safe in an Intensive Care Unit in the Santa Barbara Zoo's veterinary hospital.

With its Animal Care and Health team's extensive experience incubating eggs, helping chicks out of eggs, hand-rearing and providing medical treatment to young birds, the Santa Barbara Zoo received a permit to rehabilitate Western Snowy Plovers in 2016. It collaborates with partners such as Point Blue Conservation, CA State Parks and UC Santa Barbara, which monitor nesting birds on the busy beaches of the Central Coast.

Eggs reach the zoo after nests have been abandoned, washed out, or found by predators. The zoo checks for fertility and keeps eggs in an incubator. After hatching, chicks are kept warm and fed small insects like mini meal worms and pinhead crickets, while their development is closely monitored.





As they grow, chicks are moved to larger enclosures where they grow waterproof feathers and learn to fly. They stay at the zoo until they show signs that they are ready for life in the wild: they hunt for food, are wary of humans, can maintain their





The abandoned chick that Debra found spent about 60 days at the zoo and became the seventh plover it released in 2017 at Coal Oil Point Reserve, UC Santa Barbara. When the crate door was opened at the beach, the now banded chick flew out, and the zoo team lost sight of it in the sunny sky. The next day, that chick was spotted in the middle of about 145 plovers, successfully living life as a wild bird!
