INTRODUCING BRIANA SAPP, VICE PRESIDENT

ello, fellow birders. My name is Briana Sapp and I'm honored to be the new Vice President of Santa Barbara Audubon Society. I joined the organization as a volunteer with Eyes in the Sky in 2017, shortly after becoming Director of Marketing and Communications for the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. I'll never forget my first Thursday at the museum, as it was the first time I saw the raptors under the Oak Tree. I couldn't believe how close I could get to these amazing birds of prey, and after hearing their stories and learning about EITS, I asked if I could volunteer. I soon joined the Saturday crew led by the formidable Richard Nordli, who helped me work my way from naughty Kanati all the way up to Max. But Kisa's incredible spirit and ability to energetically connect stole my heart.

I love to travel and spent most of my 20s in Europe and Africa. I started my undergraduate career in microbiology at Cal Poly SLO with a minor in French, but after



studying abroad in Paris my junior year, I made a momentous life change and transferred to the American University of Paris, switching my studies to international politics, and starting a 10-year journey working for an embassy and international NGOs in Brussels, Belgium, focusing on advocacy for sustainable economic and environmental development in sub-Saharan Africa. I returned to my native California in 2011 and worked for the University of California Education Abroad Program, which serves all 10 campuses and operates in 41 countries. Moving to the museum was another major change in my career, and I've been lucky to fall into my dream job working for an organization whose vision "to connect people to nature for the betterment of both" aligns so well with my own passions and beliefs. I see my work with Audubon as an extension of that work and I'm committed to doing my best to help the organization grow and

STUNNING NEWS THAT DELIGHTS US

n March 18, the California Coastal Commission took two monumentally important steps on behalf of the environment:

- It voted unanimously to completely phase out off-highway vehicle access at Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area over the next three years, cutting two years off earlier plans for the phase out.
- It stated that massive coastal development and introduction of off-road vehicles planned by Parks and Recreation near Oso Flaco Lake cannot be approved under the Coastal Act.





These decisions will greatly reduce human degradation of the fragile habitats in the Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Complex, which are home to many threatened bird species (e.g. Western Snowy Plover and Least Tern) and imperiled fish species (like Steelhead Trout and Tidewater Goby).

Thanks to all members who heeded the call in our January blast to submit comments to State Parks and the California Coastal Commission. Informed citizens can make a difference!

REMEMBERING KISA

This spring, we lost Kisa, our beloved Peregrine Falcon. She joined Eyes in the Sky in 2011 as a young bird, and hers was one of our most compelling stories: She had been shot with a pellet gun and survived with the pellet still in her shoulder! For ten full years, she awed and inspired crowds as an ambassador for her species.

In 2020, Kisa was diagnosed with heart disease. She was cared for tirelessly by volunteers and spent her last days in the constant company of admiring visitors and loving friends. She passed in late February 2021.






Kisa was one of the stars of EITS. She was the bird that first brought me to the program: Seeing her on a handler's glove was my first up-close raptor experience. Bright, clever, and attentive, she had an incredible spirit. She bonded with so many people and left a mark on each one.

Soon after asking volunteers to share their memories of Kisa, I found myself flooded in photos and messages about this amazing bird. The outpouring of love for her was more than could fit into a single article. In her honor, we now have a memorial page on the SBAS website that holds a collection of photos, stories, and memories, all shared by those who had close bonds with Kisa.


GABRIELE SCUSSAT WINS 2021 JOY PARKINSON SCIENCE FAIR AWARD

After a one-year hiatus due to COVID-19, the Santa Barbara County Science Fair was held virtually on March 12, 2021. Goleta Valley Junior High 8th grader Gabriele Scussat won the Santa Barbara Audubon Joy Parkinson Award for his project entitled "Impact of Ecological Restoration on Wildlife in the Goleta North Campus Open Space."

Inspired by restoration projects he participated in as an elementary student, Gabriele wanted to determine the impact of restoration of the North Campus Open Space (NCOS) since the closing of the Ocean Meadows Golf Course in 2012. He conducted weekly monitoring of Cheadle Center for Biodiversity and Ecological Restoration (CCBER) coverboards in the NCOS and recorded the presence of 30 species of small vertebrates and invertebrates. By comparing his data from 2020-21 with coverboard data collected by CCBER in 2013-14, he found that while the overall encounter rate has not changed, different species have responded differently, with encounter rates of some groups increasing while others decreased. He concluded that long-term monitoring is necessary to observe the slow recovery of the space.

The Joy Parkinson Science Fair Award is given annually by Santa Barbara Audubon Society in honor of Joy Parkinson, who was a founding member of the chapter and a community environmental activist. Congratulations to Gabriele for his outstanding work; he went on to win Best in Fair in the Junior Division of the Science Fair.

YOUNGER GENERATIONS ARE MAKING A POSITIVE IMPACT

Marissa DeVille, a college student who is already practicing and teaching good environmental stewardship

Aarissa DeVille's interest in birds began in elementary school, when she would spend hours bird watching at her family's home in Northern California. She has continued to pursue her interest through volunteer work at a wildlife rescue center near her home, through the UCSB Goleta Coast Audubon chapter, and with SBAS, while also recognizing the importance of birding in her life as a means for contemplation and reflection.

Marissa began her association with Santa Barbara Audubon as an intern for Mark Holmgren, assisting with the Breeding Bird Study. When the COVID-19 lockdown sent schools online in the spring of 2020, she reached out to high school students to introduce them to the social, emotional, and environmental benefits of birding. She developed a virtual curriculum based on the Breeding Bird Study database to involve students in community conservation science. In addition, through her participation in the SBAS Education Committee, she developed a five-day bird focused Zoom curriculum for 4th-6th grade students, which has been enthusiastically embraced by teachers at Goleta Family School and Foothill Elementary. Says teacher Teri Briggs, "Marissa is amazing. Her passion is infectious."

Marissa will graduate from UCSB this spring with a B.A. in Environmental Studies. She plans to pursue her interest in environmental education through a summer position at NatureBridge Coastal Camp leading 1st to 6th grade students on explorations in the Marin Headlands, and hopes to become a Climate Corps Education Outside Fellow teaching elementary students, using garden spaces as an outdoor classroom.

Seventh-grader Rui Rebich Hespanha loves making origami and other kinds of art and selling it locally. In December he donated \$1 to local nonprofit organizations for each origami ornament he sold. The buyer can choose which organization to support: Foodbank of Santa Barbara, Santa Barbara Audubon Society, or Santa Barbara Bicycle Coalition (SBBIKE). In June, his creations will be on display at Goleta Coffee Co, where he hopes to raise more donations in support of SBAS and other community organizations.

Rui's thoughts on why he started this project: "I enjoy the process of making origami, and it is fun to make things that other people think are interesting or beautiful. I decided to sell origami ornaments and donate part of the money I earned because I care about making our town and our earth a nice place to live."

WHY I JOINED AUDUBON: INTRODUCING CHRISTIAN PUGA

In the future, Christian would like to combine his interests in conservation, photography and filmmaking, and working with dogs. A TOOL TO START A CONVERSATION: BEST PRACTICES FOR BIRDS

ave you ever informed a property manager about a bird safety concern or noticed rodenticide use or nest destruction at a property? Many people are unaware that their decisions can impact birds and other wildlife, or they may be unaware of alternative solutions. Informing them about your concerns and alternatives can lead to improved habitats for birds.

The following is a list of **Best Practices for Birds** at multiunit residential and commercial properties. Please share it widely and help make a large property become more bird-friendly.



- 1. Control rodents without rodenticides. Poison used to kill rodents can sicken pets and wildlife (including hawks, owls, bobcats, and coyotes) that prey on them. Read about alternatives at poisonfreemalibu.org/rodents/.
- 2. Make large windows safer for birds. An estimated 1 billion birds die in the US each year by striking glass they cannot see. Large clubhouse windows and commercial building windows pose the greatest risks. Read about cheap and easy ways to make glass visible to birds at https://birdsafe.ca/ (Article continues on page 11.)


- 3. About those mud nests under rooftop eaves...? Please DO NOT DISTURB active swallow nests! It is cruel and it is against federal and state law. California Department of Fish and Wildlife considers swallow nesting season to be February 15 to September 1, during which time it is illegal to disturb the nests without a permit. Violations are punishable by up to six months in jail or up to a \$15,000 fine. After nesting season is done, all baby birds have fledged, and nests are empty, removal and preventive deterrents can be done legally (see www.ipm.ucdavis.edu Cliff Swallow Pest Note #7482).
- 4. Most birds nest in spring and summer. Schedule major pruning of trees, hedges, shrubs, and even ivy-covered walls and fences in autumn and winter to prevent accidental destruction of nests. Remind gardeners to look before pruning. Some nests are hidden in tree crevices, some hang like socks under leaves, and hummingbird nests are tiny! If an accident does occur, call the SB Wildlife Care Network for advice at 805-681-1080.
- 5. Here's an easy one: Cap open vertical pipes. Thousands of birds die each year when they go in but can't fly out.
- 6. Avoid pesticide and herbicide use. Common neonics (artificial insecticides) are deadly to birds and pollinators. Many herbicides are toxic to people, pets, and wildlife. If needed, choose a product safe for use near children, pets and wildlife.
- 7. Deter cats from hunting birds. Cats are nonnative predators that kill over two billion birds in the U.S. annually. The good news is that cats are healthiest kept indoors. Most can be happy on a sunny windowsill or in an enclosed outdoor "catio". Some cats can learn to be walked outside on a harness and leash.
